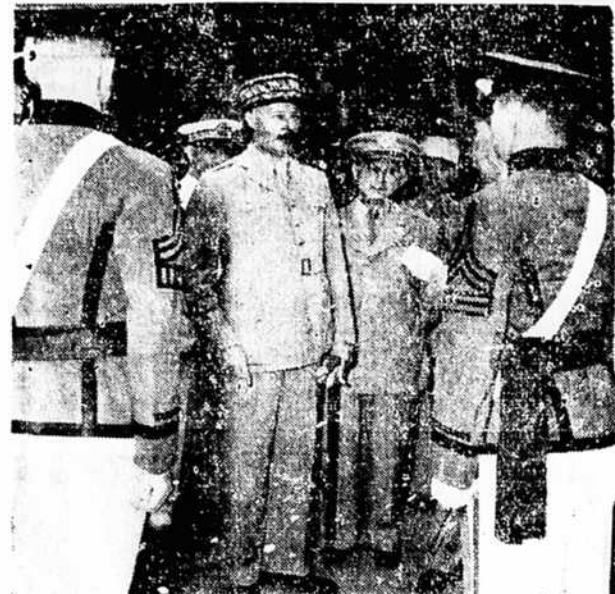

GIRAUD CHATS WITH TOP CADETS

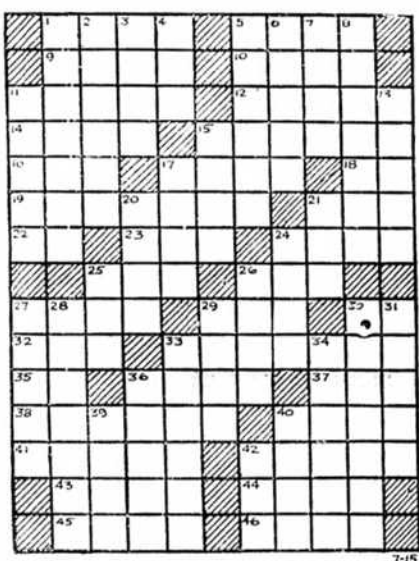

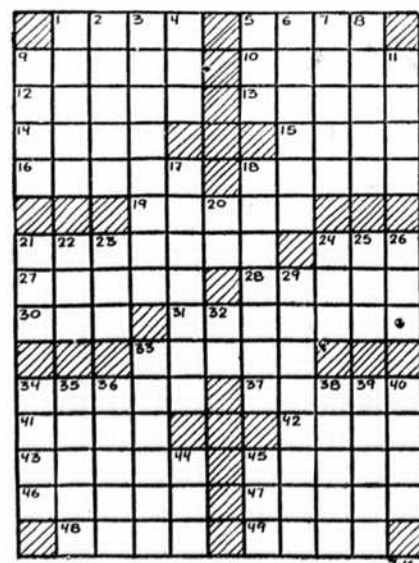

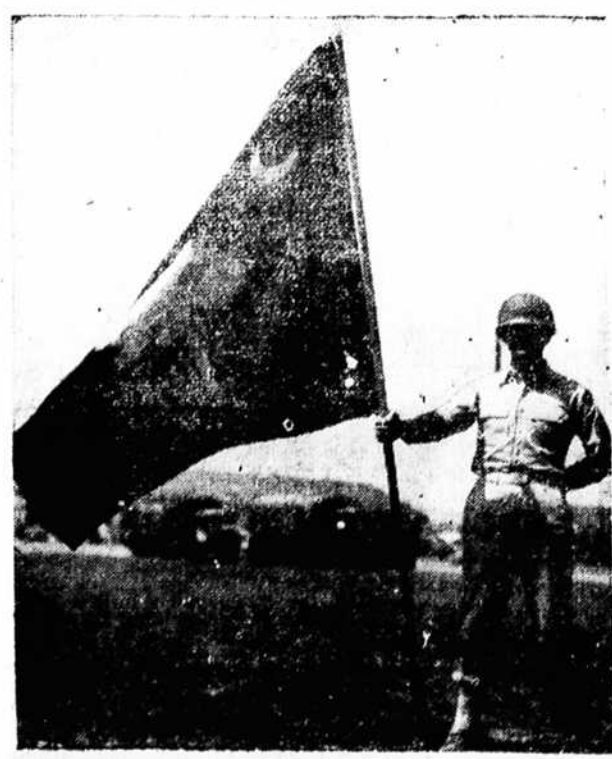
