Mrs. Dawn Shearin, president, presided over a short business session, during which reports were made by committee chairmen, and presented Mrs. S. C. Wright, program chairman.

About fifty club members and their guests were seated at the table, decorated with arrangements of crepe myrtle and marigolds, and war stamp corsages, which were made and sold by the club. A three course dinner was served.

Mrs. M. S. Gerber, international relations chairman, read "A Summer Wish" by Mrs. Mattie C. Phillips. "The Sunshine in Your Smile" was sung by Miss Elizabeth Snow, with Mrs. W. L. Parker as her accompanist, and in concluding the meeting "America" was sung by the group.

With "Women's Work in Wartime" as her subject, Miss Baldwin made a very interesting talk, covering the wide field of opportunities open to women today. As a member of the national advisory committee of the Women's Reserve of the Navy, she is well qualified to know the great need for women workers, which is said to be dire in all phases of war work. For women who remain at home, it was emphasized that they continue their study of the liberal arts, and she stressed the need for youth guidance in the local community. She was introduced by Miss Page Gooch, an alumna of Duke university.

### Epsom People Can Vegetables Grown In School Garden

The large victory garden sponsored by the Epsom P-T. A. is now being cared for by volunteer help of the school district, and large quantities of vegetables are being canned for use in the school cafeteria next year.

On Tuesday of last week a few nearby members met and processed 176 quarts of string beans, and last Tuesday a real canning party was held with 175 quarts of string beans and 41 quarts of butterbeans being canned. Next Thursday the people of Epsom again plan to process vegetables that have ripened by that time.

Tuesday a picnic luncheon was brought and served for those who assisted in canning, and it consisted of a bountiful supply of fried chicken, baked ham, sausage, chicken salad, potatoe cheese, cream cheese, and tomato sandwiches, honey cakes, cookies, pickles, sliced tomatoes, cucumbers, apples, iced tea and Pepsi-Cola, and to top it all a delicious jelly-finished molasses pudding. These were served with fresh vegetables and corn cakes cooked in the lunchroom and served hot.

Some time in the early spring the P-T. A. voted to sponsor a canning and victory garden for the benefit of the school, to help furnish vegetables for the school cafeteria which fed an average of 250 per day last year. J. T. Griffin, agriculture teacher, was asked to serve as chairman of all committees, with the privilege of naming his own committees. The committees were composed of the following: planting, E. M. Asyree and W. J. Bowen; cultivating, G. W. Hayes and Tolle Smith; equipment, Mrs. E. B. Fuller and Mrs. W. A. Rowland; canning, Mrs. O. W. Rein and Mrs. E. A. Joyner.

These committees, with the cooperation of the community, have planted and cultivated a large garden which is now producing a large supply of vegetables. Next Tuesday people of the Robbitt community will can and on Thursday Epsom people will can vegetables. The organization of the two groups was brought on because of the necessity of canning as much as two days a week.

In the garden are corn, Irish potatoes, butter beans, tomatoes, and stringbeans.

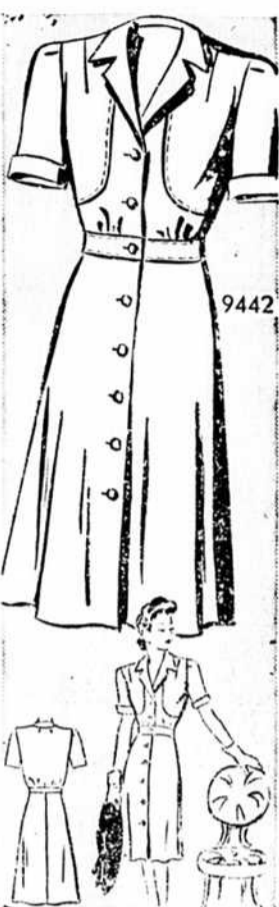

## BARCLAY ON BRIDGE

### DESTROY HIS TIMING

IF YOU can make a No Trump declarer use up a needed entry to dummy before he has its long suit established, you have destroyed his timing of the play and rendered that suit worthless to him. Counting the number of probable stoppers of the suit held by your side, and the number of entries or re-entries to get at the suit, will usually give you the key to the situation.

West naturally led the 4 of his partner's spades South, deciding to work on the dummy's hearts, rather than his own clubs, and therefore wishing to retain the spade A there as a re-entry, took the J with his K and then laid down the heart K West put on his A and then led the spade 2 to the A. The heart Q and J were seized, and the 8 led to West's 10. With no more spades, that defender returned the diamond 2, whereupon the diamond A, three more hearts

and the club A completed nine tricks for the declarer, giving him his contract.

Foresight by West should have told him to duck the heart K on the second trick. South then, if the K was a singleton, as hoped, would have had to use the diamond A to reach dummy, so he could lead more hearts. West could have taken the returned heart Q with his A, then knocked out the spade A. The hearts would be dealt then, because West could win the fourth round with his 10. That would have limited South to two tricks in hearts instead of five, and would have compelled him to let West in with clubs, whereupon a diamond lead to the K would have enabled East to finish the hand with the setting spade tricks.

### 71-Cent Egg Price Need Not Be Paid By Consumers Here

Reports of 71-cent a dozen egg in November need not scare Henderson housewives, according to Arthur H. Surprise, secretary of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce. There will be 71-cent eggs, but since practically all eggs sold in Henderson are upgraded, the price for grade AA eggs is of little interest.

The highest retail prices for upgraded eggs, for the month of November, will be 52 cents in smaller stores and direct from farmers, 51 cents in larger independent stores. The maximum price which the consumer will be permitted to ask or receive, if he sells wholesale to stores, will be 48 cents.

Upgraded eggs this week-end have a wholesale value of 39 cents and a retail ceiling of 46 cents in smaller stores, 45 cents in larger independent stores, and 44 cents in chain stores. Effective Monday and for two weeks the price will increase one cent for each group. The egg price rise is slow and normal for the fall season. These prices may be increased two cents a dozen, Surprise says, if the eggs are packed in cartons.

### PRICE ORDER STUDY TO C. OF C. MEMBERS

A very thorough but drastically condensed study of two new maximum price orders, which will control practically all retail food stores after August 5 is being delivered to members of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce, according to Arthur H. Surprise. The new orders, MPR 422 for chain stores and MPR 423 for independent stores, will replace existing orders MPR 238 and 268, and will include more than a dozen new food groups which in the past have been controlled by complicated and unwieldy methods. The new orders are definitely superior to any previous food control orders, Surprise says.

### COFFEE RATIONING MAY END AUGUST 1

Washington, July 15. (AP) — Federal Price Administration (FPA) officials predicted today that coffee rationing will end on or before August 1, and supplies of coffee will be ample to provide all the normal demand that Americans can manage.

Coffee supplies appear to be in ample quantity of all varieties—the Java, and only some totally unproductive estate—such as a new crop from Colombia—could block shipping rationing.

The verdict, it was understood, was reached at a special meeting by seven representatives of the Office of Economic Warfare, the War Relocation Authority and several independent U.S. labor groups of economic, economic restrictions on coffee and sugar.

However, in the case of sugar, of A. Leck the President was a little premature.

### LAST CALL IS ISSUED FOR FUEL OIL FORMS

The Vance war price and rationing board today issued a "last call" for applications for fuel oil forms for the current season. Practically all consumers of fuel oil have filed their applications, it was stated, but there are a few stragglers who should file their forms at once.
