Among those in the Army, with their military towns and their classes at Carolina, are Ely P. DeGaw, class of 1908, from Tryon; Early E. W. Dabson, 1916, from Wadesboro; William L. Sloan, 1904, from Danbury; C. J. Jones, S. S. Simpson, 1913, Newber; Luther S. Smith, 1907, from Tryon; and John E. Burt, 1911, from Elizabeth City.

Allen H. Tarver, 1927, from Fayetteville is a general in the Marine Corps; Wadesboro, 1911, Wadesboro, is an admiral and recipient of the Navy Cross for gallantry as commander of an aircraft carrier. All eight of Carolina's top drawer Navy and military men have been in the service for a number of years, adding the Army and Navy as permanent careers even after completion of their active training.
