Recognition Given French Committee

Washington, Aug. 25 — (AP)—America, Great Britain and Canada gave limited recognition last night to the right of the French Committee of National Liberation to administer the empire of Vichy, France, but they stopped short of calling the committee a government.
In statements so carefully worded that they showed no sign of joint composition, perhaps in the recent cabinet conference, the governments declared that it would be up to the people of France to choose their own government once the Nazis are ousted.
At London Reuters quoted the Moscow radio as announcing that Soviet Russia had recognized the French Committee.

"The Government of the United States," said a statement issued in President Roosevelt's name, "recognizes the French Committee of National Liberation as administering those French overseas territories in the event."
United States recognition was made "subject to the military requirements of the Allied commanders." While the British went a bit further and spoke of recognition with the committee in applying the principle of committee authority, it was apparent that neither went as far as the committee had desired.

EASTERN GAS ALLOWANCE OVERDRAWN, TOLKS SAYS

Washington, Aug. 25 — (AP)—Petroleum Administrator Harold I. Tolls said today that Eastern states might receive the gasoline rationed to them last week and thus diminish prospects for an immediate liberalization of rationing.
In a statement which provided direct reference to tentative plans to lift the East Coast driving ban Sept. 1, Tolls said that if consumption is not kept down, "it is obviously impossible to arrive on schedule at the necessary position which is prerequisite to the planned liberation of the East Coast."

CASH IN ON BAD LUCK
INSTEAD OF playing at your partner for his bad luck which has put you into a completely biological contract, you will make out better generally by acting expertly as if his holding was just right and concentrating on succeeding with the job which he has assigned to you. Many a time you will find that your bad luck in getting into a crazy contract may be turned into good luck if you do your job well enough.

West 1♥ East 1♠ South 1♠
Pass 5♥ Pass 4♦ Pass 5♠ Pass 7♦

West's bid was the heart K. After winning that in the dummy, the declarer built one of the most peculiar plays in many moons, which required an even split of the heart honors and also had to find the diamond 9 held by West, as well as spade honors. He won the opener with the heart A, ruffed the heart 6 with the diamond K, led to the club Q, ruffed the heart 7 with the diamond Q, led the spade 4 to the K and ruffed the heart 8 with the diamond J.

After all that high ruffing, he now had to ruff the trump 8 to avoid loss of a diamond trick. After the ruff he took in the diamond A and 10, then the club A and K. The latter squeezed West. The dummy still had the spade 7 and heart 9 and South the spade A-9 and club 8, which he discarded. West had a choice between setting up the dummy's heart by discarding the Q or throwing a spade from the QJ and thus enabling South to get two spade tricks, which he did.

Seats Vacant In Assembly

Raleigh, Aug. 25 — (AP)—Special session of the General Assembly is contemplated, but if one should become necessary there would be an unusual number of vacancies.

Three members have died since the 1943 legislature adjourned; five have resigned or vacated their seats by accepting other offices, and four are on leave duty with the fighting forces. In fact, there may be additional vacancies by reason of members accepting local offices and leave may be others in uniform whose names are not included here.

Senators William A. Graham of Lincoln and Van S. Watson of Nassau and Representative D. Bradford Peering of Dare have died.
Senator L. V. Ballew of Wake vacated his seat when he was appointed to the Board of Education, and Senator Griffith of Wayne, and Senator G. McKee of Johnston resigned seats on the State board of education, Representative Vanter C. Braxley of Durham left his seat vacant when he was named to the State ABC board. The same thing happened when Representative A. C. Edwards of Greene went to the board of education and Representative H. H. Poole of Moore to the State board of agriculture.

Senator E. T. (Curly) Saunders of Alamance, Representative Learner W. Midgett of Pasquotank and Francis Sims of Mecklenburg have commissions in the Navy. Representative Tom Turner of Guilford was recently commissioned a captain in the Army, and Representative J. S. Harris of a district into the Army in April.
There are "casualties" and vacancies in every legislature, but the number this time is unusually large.

TEACHER SHORTAGE SEEN IN ALAMANCE THIS YEAR

Graham, Aug. 27 — Alamance County schools face the beginning of the 1943-44 term with 16 teacher vacancies, it was announced today by A. E. Young, superintendent of county schools. Nine of the vacancies are in the high schools and seven in the elementary division.

Schools will open in the county on next Thursday, Sept. 2. It is estimated that approximately 6,000 white and 2,200 colored school children will be enrolled this year.

The 1943 county-wide teachers' meeting will be held at Graham on Saturday, Sept. 4, following this school opening.

Teachers of the various schools will hold meetings on Wednesday, Sept. 1, in their respective communities.
Glen Taylor, representative of the Highways and Public Works Division of the State, will visit the county tomorrow to give road tests and certify applications for road work.

ALAMANCE FIRE WATCHERS ARE GIVEN ADDED DUTIES

Washington, Aug. 27 — Volunteer fire watchers in the OGD organization in Alamance County have become fire wardens and their duties expanded, Robert T. Steele, OGD commander and chief of the fire and warning service, announced today.
Leon G. Tramm, chief of fire wardens, said that 1,500 or more volunteers are needed to man 30 pumps, designed for a minimum crew of three persons, scattered throughout the county area.

Commander Steele explained that Alamance County is considered to be in a vital area, only a few minutes from the coastal area, and that fire guards would in the event of emergency tackle fires that might originate from houses or incendiaries in widely dispersed areas.
