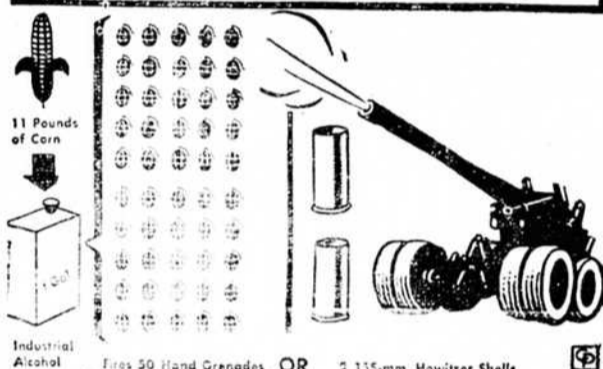


**HIGH-POWERED PROPAGANDA**



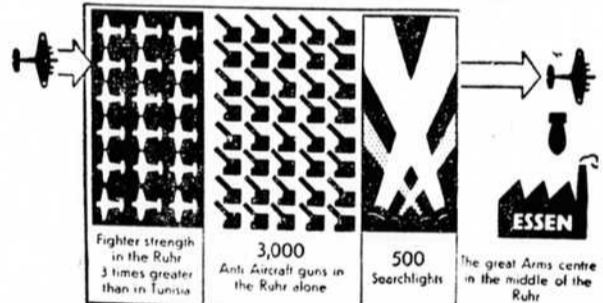
ONE OF THE EFFECTIVE METHODS used in Sicily by the Allies to induce Axis troops to surrender was to fire propaganda material from guns. Using ordinary shells (top), British soldiers stuff them with printed sheets. When fired over the enemy lines (bottom) the shell explodes and spreads the leaflets over a wide area. (International)

**A HEADACHE FOR THE AXIS**



PRODUCTION OF HARD LIQUORS has virtually ceased in the United States for the duration, but American distilleries are busy in the war production of industrial alcohol. 20,000,000 gallons of which will come from distillery cuts this year. This chart shows one use in which alcohol serves the war effort—the manufacture of explosive charges. And with liquor stocks dwindling, Americans will fire more shots at the Axis. (International)

**WHAT RAF BOMBERS FACE**



"FORTY OF OUR PLANES failed to return." These words appear often in communiqués describing RAF raids on Germany. Why the losses occur is illustrated graphically by the chart above, which shows the opposition the RAF met in a recent bombing of industrial Essen. (International)

Gen. William N. Haskell



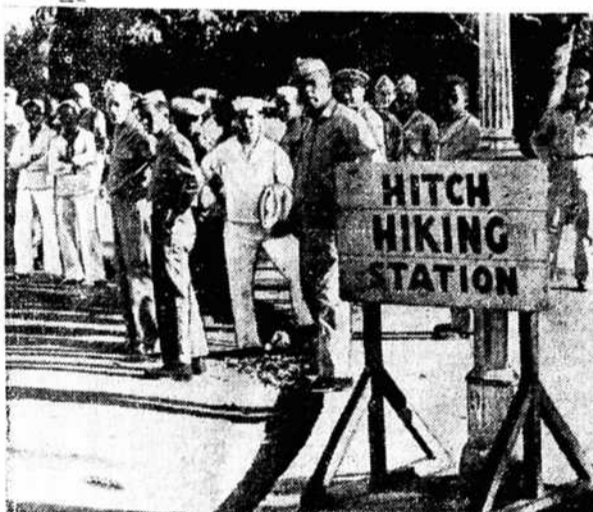
Joe R. Hanley, State Senator

A GROUP of flying officers who recently returned from the South Pacific have selected Tess Daniels as Hibiscus Queen of Cypress Gardens, Florida. (International)

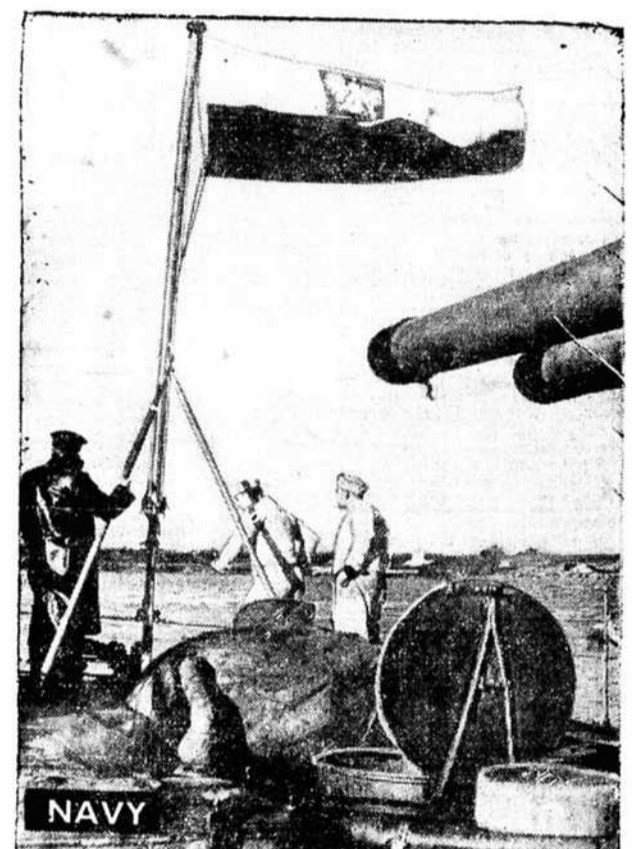
**Poland Fights on—Four Years After Nazi Invasion**

As part of this attack, the Poles will have a chance to exact their revenge. The Poles shown here are a small part of those who couldn't see eye to eye with Herr Hitler's New Order. They'll be the spearhead of that army of vengeance poised to free once democratic Poland.
