# Peanut Crop Is Harvested

Raleigh, Oct. 7.—Digging of the peanut crop in North Carolina and Virginia was delayed by the unfavorable weather last week, but conditions now are favorable for harvesting.

Spot cotton prices were about unchanged for the week. Buying of spot cotton increased but the volume of sales reported by the 10 markets was substantially smaller than a year ago. The mid-week weather report indicated that picking was delayed by rain in the southeastern and southwestern portions of the belt, but otherwise progress was fairly considering the available labor supply.
