Meredith Plans Campaign For \$565,000 Expansion

Raleigh, Oct. 12—At a call meeting of the board of trustees of Meredith College, held at the college this week-end, it was unanimously voted to launch a fund-raising campaign immediately that would provide a total of \$565,000 to be used for the construction of a chapel and college building, a gymnasium and swimming pool, and a library building. In addition to these buildings, approximately \$200,000 would be spent on the present structures in making alterations and general needed improvements. The program was presented over by W. H. Weatherston, of Raleigh, president of the board.

The action of the trustees was, in effect, an approval of the action taken by the executive committee, which was instructed at the regular annual trustees' meeting in July, 1942, to develop a definite plan for procurement of the necessary facilities of the college, \$65,000 of the amount needed is now in hand.

At the trustees' meeting held here this week-end, a report from LeRoy Martin, chairman of the executive committee, set forth the findings of Harts and Lundy, Incorporated, of New York City, who recently made a survey for the college.

The proposed new building would eliminate many of the temporary buildings that have been in use since the college was moved to its present site, and will fill a long felt need of the college. According to the proposed plans, all class rooms would be taken care of in permanent building.

"Business Women's Week Is Being Observed This Week in North Carolina."
