Tar Heels In All-Southern Bid Saturday

Chapel Hill, Nov. 25.—The North Carolina eleven, which stands No. 13 among the leading national gridiron teams today, has several stars to its credit, making their final bid for All-Southern against Virginia in Nor-

folk Saturday.

One almost sure shot is Henson Rodgers, 195-pound fullback. Coach George Grimes said he was the "best Penn had last year," Army and Navy included, and his own coaches vow he could "make any eleven in the country."

The Tar Heels will take their final drill today and leave by bus at noon Friday. Eddleott will be at Foreman Field at 2 o'clock Saturday, and a never-seen-a-day crowd is expected to see the old rivals resume their tied series.

Rodgers is leading the whole club in total scoring and rushing, but

who has been selected as Carolina's netting captain against his old mates, has the No. 1 advantage with 6.12 yards per try.

Grimes, who incidentally passed for both the Virginia schools on Saturday last year, has warned the Tar Heels' veterans this week that they will need to be at their best against the Cavaliers.

"They have one of the best records in Virginia," he pointed out today. "In fact, their one college loss in the State was to Richmond. I know how they are shaped up for Carolina, and I know they'll be right again Saturday."

Other leading backs All-Southern include Jack Fitch, who scored on Tech twice; saved the Penn game; Ralton Straughn and Eddie Temple, ex All-Soph-Southern guard and back; Billy Myers, who scored on Duke and Virginia; Barney Poole, 200-yard end, and Ulysses Cornog, 60-minute tackle.

George Hodges, 210-pound tackle from Norfolk, who did some fine work against Duke last week, is the only Virginian boy on the squad besides Grimes, but Red Jones, utility lineman, is from nearby Edenton.

This will be Carolina's first appearance in Norfolk since 1939. The Tar Heels need out V. P. I., 3rd, that day and set a new attendance mark of 36,000. V. P. I. and Virginia had a Norfolk last year.
