## RUSSIANS CIRCLING RUMANIAN STRONGHOLD



AS WENDELL WILLKIE goes delegate hunting in the open primary spaces of the West and one of the toughest presidential campaigns in U. S. history challenges the world war for public attention, the political map areas have Democratic particularity. ## 21 Dead In Blaze Called Incendiary In San Francisco

San Francisco, March 28.—(AP)—Twenty-one persons were known dead and a score of injured in hospitals after a blaze which Fire Chief Albert J. Sullivan said "undoubtedly must have been incendiary" swept through the New Amsterdam hotel early today.
