GIVE ONE TO SAVE TWO MOST so-called "safety plays" should more properly be called "sacrifice plays," for they involve the giving up of a trick in order to prevent the loss of two, or else give up two to prevent the loss of three. Some of them work differently, however. They do not involve the deliberate loss of any trick, but merely increase to some extent your chance for avoiding the loss of too many tricks.



It is true that, when you hold five trumps, including the A or Q, the best chance to take all the tricks in the suit is to toss the Q on the first round. But, if you can afford to lose one trick and not two, your better play is the A on the first round, then a lead toward the Q, intending to come up with it unless the K is played. That principle was the only point involved in the play of this hand. West led the diamond K to the A. Since South saw he could put a losing club on a spade, his side

to justify an independent commission to meet once a month. 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For such vegetable crops as cabbage and turnips, he suggested the use of a dust made of one ounce of 40% nicotine sulphate and one pound of hydrated lime. A dozen small stones placed in the tight container with the materials will aid in the mixing. A plunger or blower type duster can be used and the dust is most effective when the temperature is above 60 degrees.

For aphids on roses or other ornamental shrubs, the nicotine spray will probably be most effective, Maxwell said.

Keep Fit As A Fiddle

By Drinking a Quart of Milk Every Day

College Station, Raleigh, April 7.—Plant lice, or aphids, the soft bodied, sucking insects that annually cause many thousands of dollars damage to garden crops, flowers, and ornamental shrubs can easily be killed with a nicotine spray of dust, it is announced by J. Myron Maxwell, in charge of extension entomology at State College.

Most of the aphids are green but they may vary in color from gray to powdery blue, or even brown or pink. They suck the juices from plants, causing them to become stunted and the leaves to wither, turn yellow, and die.

Maxwell suggests a spray of one quart of water, two teaspoonfuls nicotine sulphate, and one tablespoonful soft tannin. Thoroughly wash the spray should be applied with a good pressure sprayer, and care should be taken to see that the spray strikes all the aphids. Those that are not hit by the spray will not be killed," Maxwell



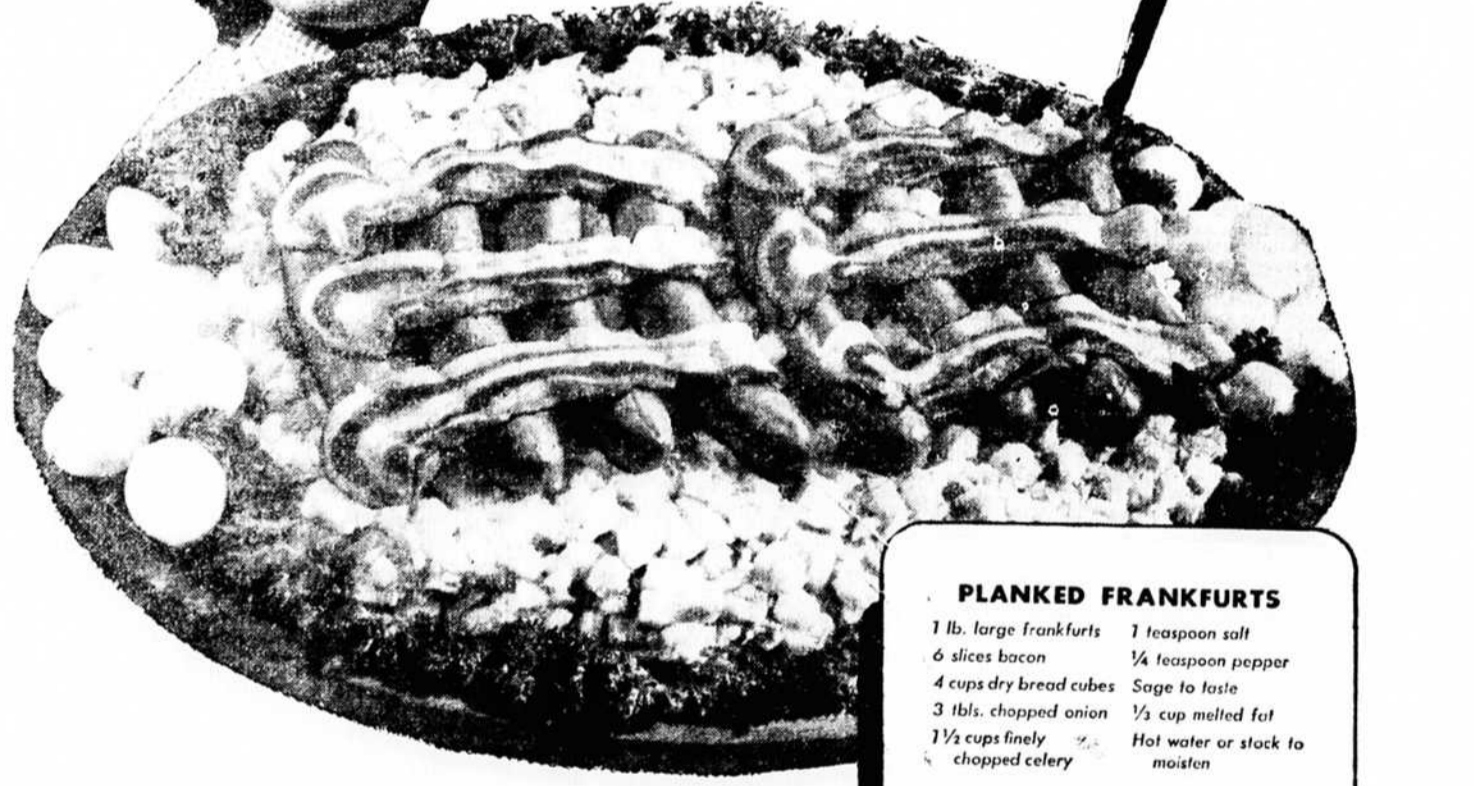

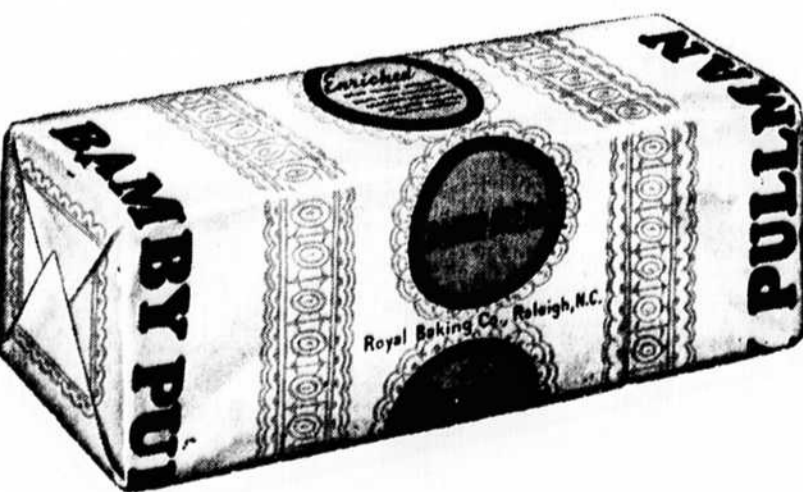

| 1 lb. large frankfurts | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 6 slices bacon | 1/4 teaspoon pepper |
| 4 cups dry bread cubes | Sage to taste |
| 3 lbs. chopped onion | 1/3 cup melted fat |
| 1 1/2 cups finely chopped celery | Hot water or stock to moisten |

Combine bread, onion, celery, and seasonings; add fat and sufficient liquid to moisten. Toss gently to mix. Pile dressing on a wooden plank and bed frankfurts onto dressing; lay strips of bacon over top. At each end of plank arrange onions which have been parboiled 15 minutes. Bake in medium oven (350° F.) for 45 minutes. Serves 6.
