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Plenty of Service For Service Men Is Assured on Return

Raleigh, April 12.—Whatever complaints soldiers and sailors returning from the wars may have, they cannot honestly complain that government isn't making an effort to help them get re-established in civilian life.

Operating under one sometimes overlooked phase of the selective service act, which is commonly regarded as the agency that takes men into military service, the State Selective Service headquarters is this week starting a series of regional meetings to get into effect the statutory requirement for selective service assistance in returning soldiers in getting home.

A few weeks ago the United States employment service announced a program about the same time, and the state department of labor has arranged to set up a number of branch offices of the veterans bureau.

Chief purpose of the present series of conferences is to coordinate activities of all these other agencies and to bring them into harmony with federal laws imposing responsibility upon selective service.

There has been no conflict of jurisdiction, and none is expected. But with so many separate agencies at work in the same field there could be confusion and confusion is to be avoided.

The conferences are under general supervision of Lt. Col. Thomas H. Upton, assistant chief of selective service office. With him will be representatives of all the other commissions and agencies interested.

The meetings have been set in Raleigh and Wilmington Tuesday, April 11; Winston-Salem Wednesday, Monday, April 12; Charlotte Thursday, Monday, April 13; and Durham Friday, Monday, April 14.

Almost every branch of government is represented in the field.


