Bombers Smash German War Plants

1,500 Axis Troops Slain By Soviets

East Front Essentially Unchanged

Attempts by Enemy To Make Advances Definitely Crashed

London, May 2.—(AP)—A Soviet communique said today that approximately 1,500 Axis troops were slain yesterday in local fighting in Romania and old Poland, but the bulletin reported no essential changes on the East front, where the Red army has been reported preparing for a new offensive.

The communique said that German troops had been driven back from a number of positions in the Balkans.

The Germans have been retreating after fighting southeast of the point, and also southwest of Kovel, which is 120 miles southeast of Warsaw. On the basis of the Soviet accounts, the fighting in the Kovel sector was raging only about four miles from the Kovel-Lvov railway connecting the two Axis German wings in former Poland.

The Russians announced yesterday that they had captured the city of Kovel, a town of 100,000 people, and that the Germans had retreated to the city of Lvov, 100 miles to the east.

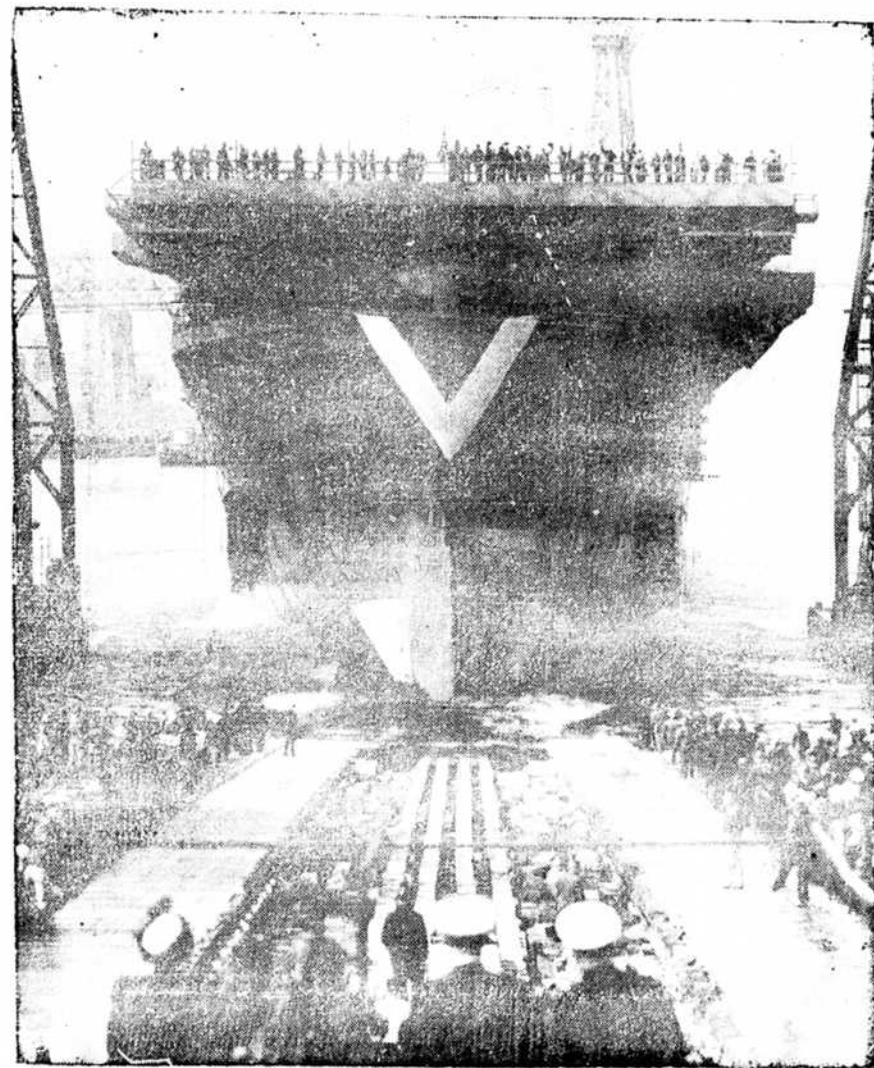
