

U.S. ARMY PURSUES NAZIS NORTH OF ROME

Insurance Held As Commerce In Supreme Court's Decision

36 States Protested On Ruling

75 Year-Old Rule Of Supreme Court Is Thus Nullified

Washington, June 5—(AP)—Overruling a decision that has stood for 75 years, the Supreme Court held today that insurance is commerce in interstate commerce and is subject to the Sherman antitrust act.

Justice Black wrote the court's opinion, saying that a 75-year-old decision, which held that insurance was not interstate commerce, was overruled.

The case specifically involved 29 insurance companies and 27 individuals connected with the Southeastern Underwriters Association in Florida, Alabama, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

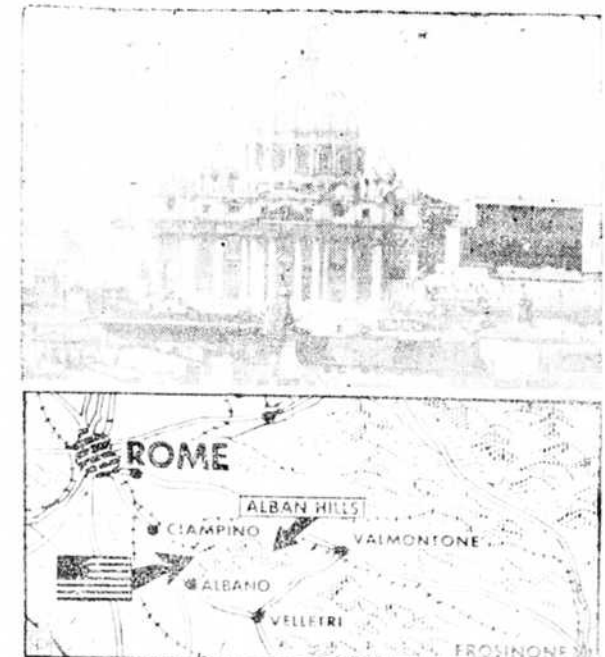
