

Mayor Powell Asks For Full Support Of Fifth War Loan

County Chairman Says Invasion Makes Necessary Bigger Purchases Than Ever

Mayor Henry T. Powell, who is county chairman for the Fifth War Loan drive here, today made an appeal to all citizens to support the drive as they have never before.

Every bond bought in the past has already played its part in bringing the war to an earlier end, he said, and the more bonds are bought now the fewer American lives will be lost.

Unless we make the maximum effort to do everything humanly possible, either at our work, in our homes or with our dollars, we are leaving over our share of the burden for our fighting men," he said.

The campaign begins throughout the county next Monday, and an organization has already been set up here to give the drive in Vance county. The bond quota is \$1,425,000.

The county's division, under direction of Mrs. A. W. Ghobson, Jr., outlined the program last Monday night at a officers' meeting. Merchants are also expected to do their share in the drive.

The county's appeal of every citizen to buy bonds in the Fifth War Loan drive is to be continued through the month of May.

It is pointed out that we shall not permit that happen here, especially when we look around in our homes and places of employment and

see the shadows of relatives and friends who are today in the midst of bloody battle for us.

I cannot emphasize too strongly that regardless of how much we may contribute in this Fifth War Loan, it will be a future unless you exceed anything you have done in the past.

In this invasion hour, your son, your brother, your friend, has a right to demand that you make your recent contribution to the success of the war loan.

The slogan "Back the Attack, Buy More than Before" is not merely a catch phrase. It expresses the cold facts about invasion. Unless we make the supreme effort to do everything humanly possible, either at our work, or in our homes or with our dollars, we are leaving over our share of the burden to our fighting men.

Every war bond you have bought in the past has already played its part in bringing the war to an earlier end.

Secretary Morgenthau's keynote is the text of the Fifth War Loan. "Before the last shot is fired a lot of lives are going to be lost and a lot of billions spent." The more war bonds bought the less American lives will be lost.

Is there any one in Henderson or Vance county, which have been free of the noise of battle, who cannot buy one more war bond than he has planned? Is there any one who cares about the life of some man who is somewhere overseas, who will not say this is the time to send the word along? We are backing you with everything we have!

Recorder Has 27 Cases In Month Of May

Twenty-seven defendants were listed in Vance county recorder's monthly report of Superior Court Clerk E. O. Faller, today. There were fifteen convictions.

Eight of the 27 defendants were white men and three were white women, with 13 colored men and three colored women.

Five of the defendants paid costs of trial and costs. Four were found not guilty, and three on no-bill were acquitted. Possible cases were found in one instance in which the defendant was found over to superior court. One was found to fail and one to inventory.

Nine, or exactly one-third of the 27 were charged with some form of anti-trust law violation. Three were charged with public drunkenness from their own manufacture of beverages for sale and possession of a still for producing whiskey for sale, and one man with drunken driving and possession of home brew for sale.

Three defendants were charged with operating a motor vehicle with no proper license, two each with speeding and resisting an officer in performance of duty and with assault. One defendant each was charged with abandonment and non-support, larceny, giving a worthless check, another, trespass, reckless driving, failure to take treatment for tuberculosis, and breaking and entering and larceny and receiving.

The 27 cases tried last month compared with 74 in May last year and 42 in April this year. It was the largest number of cases for any month in 1944 thus far.
