PERVED—Some of the Capitol Square personnel, as well as a good many citizens scattered over the State, confess to a little peeve at being denied the privilege of voting against Reynolds. They feel they were cheated out of something when he voluntarily declined to run for reelection. So they want to sock him some other way.

PRECEDENT—However, Senator Reynolds was distinguished precedent for leading all to his office with his \$10,000 annual salary and other emoluments. The same claim was made for Senator Simmons to retire after he refused to support the Democratic nominee for president in 1928, but he returned his seat and ran again in 1930 when he was defeated by J. W. Bailey. There is, of course, precedent of a candidate for a position between the status of an active one. The candidate once first and only allegiance to the party that nominated him after election his allegiance to the whole people, regardless of party affiliation. Most competent observers will agree that Reynolds was wise not to run again, but he would have been defeated in the primary. Many of these same people will question the propriety of demanding the resignation as senatorial because he just happened to be in the party.

MIX-UP—Frank stories about the recent primary continue to come in. Frank says he just learned that he was the victim of mistaken identity in the election. There's a little friendly rivalry between Secretary of State E. H. Tamm and State Treasurer Chas. T. Johnson. Johnson is very proud of having the entire State ticket in primary vote. He is proud that he has in 1944 vote, behind the leader, but in 1940 he was only 600 votes behind the treasurer. He thought he was all right in 1940, but wouldn't protest his victory. The primary would get so far ahead of him here. Reason is found in one of these little misunderstandings that happen up big ways.

MISTAKE—Here's what happened. Several years ago the State School Commission, recreated a school bus so that it stopped nearly a mile from the home of Mr. Hartness in Lenoir. Later Hartness jumped on Dr. Clyde Erwin, State superintendent, about it. Erwin told him he had nothing to do with it, that he should make the matter up with the secretary of the State School Commission. Hartness got the secretary confused, and in the last election was all-out against the secretary of state. Erwin still carried the county nearly three to one over his opponent, but he lost two precincts because of that mistaken identity.

PEACHES—North Carolina peach growers are fairly well pleased with the 1944 yielding price of \$4 a bushel, \$2.16 for half bushel baskets, of top grade peaches. That doesn't mean they will get the four dollars, but it means there's something to shoot at. At August 16, when most of the crops will have been marketed, the selling drops to \$3.60 and \$1.90. That is a pretty good deal for the peach men had looked for, if any selling were established.

WHEAT—Upon returning from a trip across the State a few weeks ago, your reporter noted that there was more wheat than ever seen before. Now the agricultural census figures back up that statement. Wheat production in this state in 1944 is officially about 9,480,000 bushels, just over an increase of 60 percent. Increase was noted both in acreage and in production. Last year's 465,000 acres grew to 553,000 this year, and the average yield jumped from 12.5 to 17 bushels per acre.

WOOD—Some 200 farmers from 45 eastern Carolina counties participated in a "wood pool" sale at Raleigh Tuesday, selling 20,000 pounds of wood at 40 cents—plus some later adjustments that may bring the total price to 5 cents a cord.

# Ens. Turner Wins Bronze Star For Heroic Service

The citation accompanying the award reads as follows: "For heroic and meritorious service in combat with the enemy. Turner was engaged in the recovery of the wreckage of the aircraft carrier USS Yorktown (CV-5) on 10-17-1942."

# Drought Effects On Tobacco Seen In Crop Reports

The latest tobacco crop estimate by the United States Department of Agriculture shows the effects of the dry season with a decrease of more than 112,000,000 pounds from the early Spring bumper blue-cured crop prediction.

The crop report of July 12 estimates the 1944 blue-cured crop to be 622,455,000 pounds as against the early season prediction of 946,000,000 pounds and the 1943 production of 791,000,000 pounds.

The new barley prediction of 411,536,000 pounds is 200,000,000 pounds from the early prediction of 611,536,000 pounds.
