AROUND CAPITOL SQUARE

DETERMINED—The group of hostile farm farmers that called upon Governor Broughton Wednesday to solicit his support in their demands for more absentee voting centers in their counties during August were determined to get their way. The group was headed by State Senator Casson M. Jones, member of the House, and the speaker expressed hope of being able to get the bill passed this week.

CONFUSION—But, as was the confusion in soldier voting two years ago, it was even worse in the recent state primary elections. The 1944 election will find confusion worse than ever. In that phase of operations, the North Carolina election law, supported by the federal act, provides that state ballots must be used unless the soldier's copy and the term "soldier" is generic, it means soldiers, sailors, wives, dependents, but the law to get a state absentee election center that he had filed by October 1. In that event the soldier voter can use a federal ballot which may include names or candidates or no include only the party label if the soldier wants to vote. In some words, if the soldier says he wants to vote the straight Democratic ticket, then his vote is counted for the candidates of the party all the way from bottom to top.

PREMATURE—What is causing the current uneasiness about the soldier voting business is receipt this week by Secretary of State Thad Egan, ex-officio administrator of the federal balloting, of two ballots from service men. By inference these voters are certifying as of early July that they had requested and could not get state ballots by October 1. That is absurd on its face.

DISTRIBUTION—It is obvious that if the army and navy are to get ballots into the hands of the millions of potential voters in and beyond the borders of the United States by November the job of distribution must be started early. On the other hand, it is equally obvious that if soldiers are going to start returning the votes before October the whole objective of moving opportunity for intelligent
