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AROUND CAPITOL SQUARE

Raleigh, July 27.—Dr. R. S. Dean, assistant director of the United States Bureau of Mines, here in connection with establishment of a branch office at the State College, gave expression to some of his ideas for future development of mineral resources in North Carolina and throughout the nation. Existing resources, he stated, are being used in an efficient manner, but the idea of fixing a use pattern and then seeking minerals to fit it represents a chapter that is in its last stages. He thinks a future policy should be based on the idea of fixing the use pattern to the resources which are available.

REVOLUTION—This may mean almost a revolution in the metal industry, he said. The popular method of producing steel from iron ores by use of blast furnaces and the Bessemer process requires a particular type of iron. Up to now the supply of that type has been adequate, but authorities agree it is approaching exhaustion. The iron companies have laboratories and metallurgists working on methods of converting new ore deposits to fit old specifications. Dr. Dean thinks they are working from the wrong end and they ought to be trying to process the iron in the wrong end, or something comparable. After all processes and use and habits of the people are changed. The one unchangeable factor is the natural ore bed.

INVENTOR—Dr. Dean, who has numerous inventions and metallurgical discoveries to his credit, has the inventor's typical respect for experimentation. He isn't afraid of change, he does fear stagnation. One of the chief purposes of the laboratory and research plant being set up at State College will be to find new methods of reducing ores from their original state to usable metal, and if some entirely new metal results, one that can be substituted for present known metals, he will be neither surprised nor sorry.

AGREEMENT—Greene Cherry and Ralph McDonald have reached complete agreement on one point. It was this: A lady from Atlanta got on the train that brought most of the North Carolina delegation home from Chicago. She expressed desire to meet the next governor of this State, having met and liked the present one. As she was in the car, she was introduced to Governor Broughton by Cherry. Dr. McDonald came by and after further introductions, said to Cherry, "Governor, I think the best you can do is to offer temporary patronage upon Mr. Broughton." Cherry promptly replied, "I have for the first time you and I have in complete agreement. That is an excellent idea and it will be executed just as soon as possible." So far as the "official" conference between the governor-nominate and his recent primary opponent and all in the first definite "pledge" made by the governor-to-be.

ACTION—Governor Broughton, such as his desk after more than a week's absence attending the Chicago convention, has no time to give to the business of the state. One of his first official acts was to issue an executive order, under his emergency wartime power to defer opening of all business auction markets in the State one week. When asked if he had been subjected to pressure from Duke alumni to have one of their group named, he said, "Not yet, but I'm considering it." He said he was more interested in getting the best person possible, with a view to interest in education, than in selecting an appointee on basis of what schools he had attended.

PUBLICITY—North Carolina has gotten some fine nationwide publicity as result of the picture-taking tour last month on which your reporter accompanied the director and photographer of the State News-Advertising Bureau, Photographer Johnny Hemmer has on the bulletin board in his office some five hundred clippings of the pictures used by papers and magazines all over the country. These include scenes of the Elizabeth City high school band marching at Nag's Head, the soldier-side shelter at Statesville, the littlest post office at Grimeshaws, the community of Japan and many others. Some of the pictures used may be representative of the State but the main point is every one of them carried a North Carolina headline. An unexpected result was the inquiry from Life magazine about the Elizabeth City band story. Life wants to do a special on that, probably will next year.

SLIP—That this and other kinds of publicity about North Carolina is needed and will eventually pay dividends is emphasized by another yarn from the Chicago convention. There were several ludicrous, perhaps inexcusable, slips of the tongue there. Such as the guy seconding the nomination of "Theodore" Roosevelt for president. North Carolina has frequently been embarrassed by having its good points attributed to Virginia and South Carolina's bad points attributed to us, but it isn't often we're mixed up with a midwestern state. Returned delegates from Chicago, however, report that when our governor was named on a committee to escort a big shot to the platform he was announced as "Governor J. Melville Broughton of North Dakota." (Maybe that's one reason he didn't get more southern votes for vice president.)

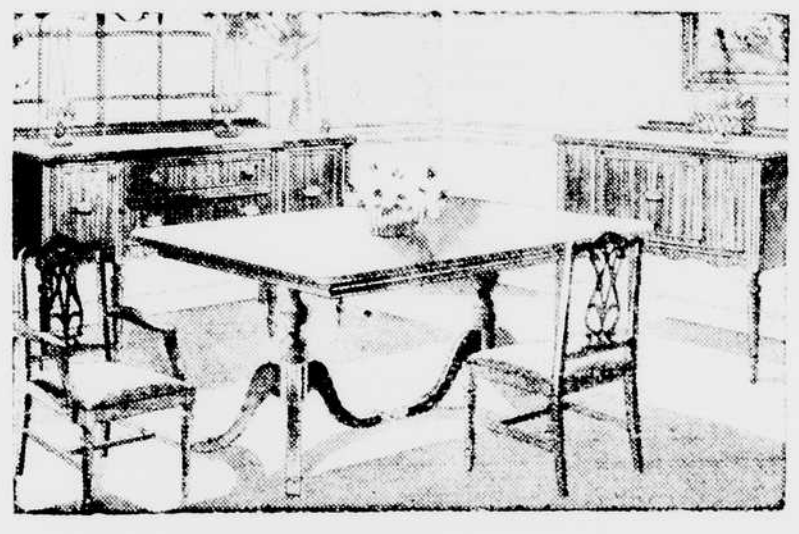
WARRANT ISSUED FOR MUSICIAN UNION CASE

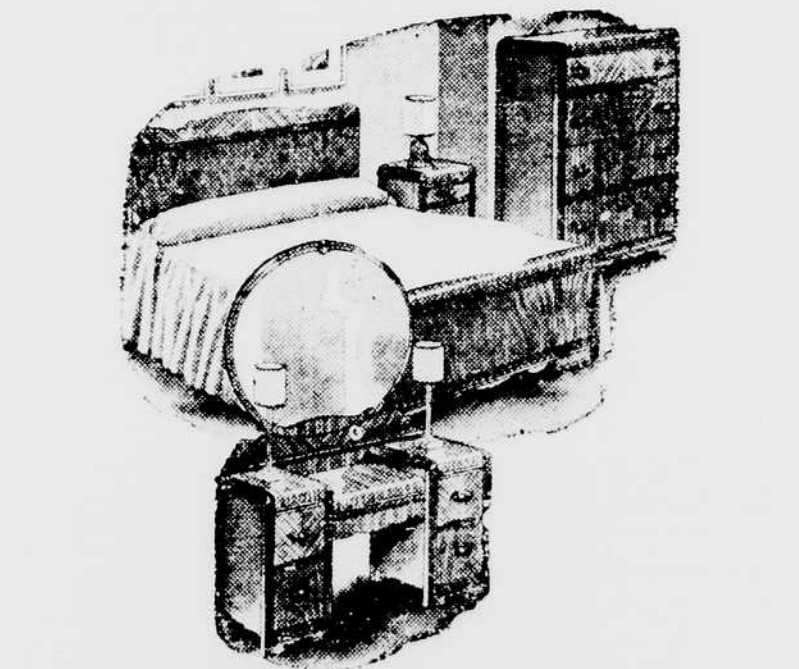

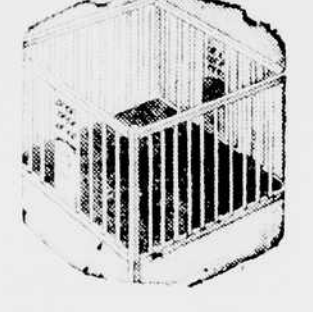

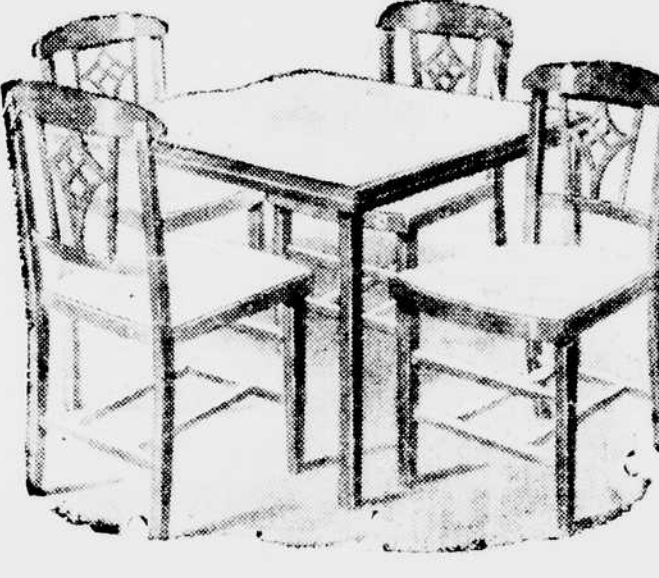
