DRUGGISTS TO RECRUIT NURSES FOR WAR DUTY

Miss Edna Oliver, of Henderson, and D. D. Hocutt, prominent Henderson pharmacist, have been appointed co-chairmen for Vance county in the state drive to recruit 1500 young women in the United States Cadet Nurse Corps.

The campaign is sponsored by the North Carolina Nursing Council for War Service in cooperation with the North Carolina Pharmaceutical Association. Appointments were made by Hazel C. Williams, of Raleigh, state student recruitment officer, and by L. T. Roamer, of Durham, state chairman of the pharmacy committee.

Vance county drug stores and drug stores throughout the State are serving as information centers for the recruiting campaign. Application blanks and informative literature may be obtained from the stores. Other activities planned by the local chairmen are window displays in leading drug stores and appearances before local civic clubs.

Young women who wish to apply for the Corps must be between 17 1/2 and 35 years of age, be in good health, graduate of an accredited high school and preferably, to have been in the upper half of their class.

The training program consists of 30 months of theory and practice and six months of service in some hospital. All expenses for the student are paid during training plus a monthly cash allowance.

"Thousands of graduate nurses have joined the Army and Navy Nurse Corps, leaving a serious gap in home front nursing," the local chairman said. "This is an opportunity for young women to fill that gap and at the same time prepare themselves for a proud profession."

Accepted applicants may choose any of the hospitals throughout the nation which are conducting the Cad-

et Nurse Corps program. In N. C. the following accredited schools of nursing are participating: Mission of Asheville; Grace of Banner Elk; Charlotte Memorial, Mercy and Presbyterian of Charlotte; Cabarrus General of Concord; Duke, Watts and Lincoln (colored) of Durham; Highsmith of Fayetteville; St. Leo's of Greensboro; Burrus Memorial of High Point; Thompson Memorial of Mt. Airy; N. C. State Hospital, Roxboro and St. Agnes (colored) of Raleigh; Rocky Mt. Sanitarium and Park View of Rocky Mount; Rutherfordton; H. F. Long of Statesville; Shelby Hospital of Shelby; James Walker Memorial and Community (colored) of Wilmington; Carolina General and Woodard-Huntington of Wilson City Memorial, N. C. Baptist; and Kate Bitting Reynolds Memorial (colored) Winston-Salem.
