### Chamber Groups To Make New Plans on Two-County Project

Efforts to develop a two-county airport, involving the counties of Vance and Wayne, will be continued by the Chamber of Commerce of Vance county and the Chamber of Commerce of Wayne county. # 41 Convicted In August In County Court

Forty-one out of a total of 51 defendants cited in recorder's court of Vance county in August were convicted, according to the monthly report today by E. O. Falkner, superior court clerk. Of the 51 defendants, 23 were white men and five white women, and 19 were colored men and four colored women.

Thirty-six defendants paid costs or costs and fines, and costs were remitted for five. Nine were acquitted and a directed verdict of not guilty was entered in one case.

Fines imposed amounted to \$317.50 and fees were \$401.323, a total of \$718.82.

Twelve of last month's defendants were charged with some form of liquor law violations, five of them with public drunkenness, four with possession of whiskey for sale, two with drunken driving and one with transporting whiskey. Thirteen defendants were fined for assault, seven for speeding and five for assault with a deadly weapon.

Three were charged with reckless driving, and two each with larceny, operating a motor vehicle without proper license, trespass, immoral conduct. One each was tried for using indecent language, violating health laws, and possessing an improper operator's license.

Last month's procedures in recorder's court compared with 37 cases in August last year, when fines amounted to \$157.50, and fees to \$352.11, a total of \$509.61; and 70 cases in July this year, when fines amounted to \$352.50 and fees \$473.86, a total of \$826.36.

# 25 or More Youngsters At First Grid Practice

little, but the coach held them mostly to exercises to get them in shape. Most of the group are small, out who they lacked in size, they made up for in enthusiasm.

Harley Mills and Johnny Allen have enlisted in the Navy since last year's football season closed, which leaves at least two positions open in the backfield. In the line were missing Ollie Vaughan, Lawrence Lowry, James Tolson, James Walker, George O'Leary, and George "Firecracker" Tucker, several of whom are in service or plan to be soon.

Some four or five veterans of last year's squad did not appear yesterday, but were expected to turn out at today's practice.

W. R. Whitterton, coach of the team last year, was at the first practice and stated that he thought there was good football material on the field yesterday.

Coach Daily said he is going to put the boys through their paces from now on and plans for a winning team from Henderson high this year.

## W. A. BRAMBERRY, SAL CLAIMS MAN, DIES

Was Widely Known in This City and Highly Esteemed by Host of Friends Here

Friends here learned today of the death in Norfolk of W. A. Bramberry, 58, assistant claims attorney for the Seaboard Air Line railway. He was widely known here as well as over the Seaboard system and was held in high esteem by his acquaintances.

Mr. Bramberry died Monday after an illness of several months. Funeral services were held this afternoon at Oliver Funeral Chapel in Norfolk, and burial was there.

He entered service of the Seaboard 42 years ago and had been with the railroad continuously. His first connection was in the capacity of a clerk in Norfolk. Later he became private secretary to the president, and then started law at night and took a special course in law at the University of Virginia. He was admitted to the bar before the Virginia Supreme Court. For many years he traveled as a claim agent, and about a year ago was made assistant claims attorney.

## Liquor Sales Off \$3,000 For August

Sales at Vance county's one liquor store amounted to \$28,306.25 in August, a drop of more than \$3,000 from August last year, and more than \$4,000 under July this year, according to statistics announced today by the County ABC Board.

Sales in August last year were \$32,346.20 and in July this year were \$32,613.6. Last month's sales were the lowest since March.

For eight months in 1944 gross sales were \$236,921.10, compared with \$301,133.90 for the comparable period in 1943, or a decline of about \$64,212.80.

## RECORDER TRIES HOM EBREW CASE
