Last year when the public schools began their fall term, students were reminded of the chaos, the suffering and the turmoil existing in the world in which they found themselves.

Gobbels Mouthings

Hitler's liaison man with the people of his crumbling empire had to say something. Almost anything was better than nothing.

Germany cannot be conquered, Germany has tremendous new weapons," he shouted as if to bolster morale of the bewildered Japs to whom he spoke in particular.

Gobbels may have been right, at least in saying Germany will not capitulate. It begins to appear that actually she will not. But to proclaim that Germany cannot be conquered is so much hokum.

Give the Nazis credit for ingenuity, though. However immovable the channel defenses prior to the invasion, they were really not important, after all—to hear the German admit after they had suffered irrefragable defeat there.

Further and further eastward the Huns retreat. Where would they stop if the Russians were to break through in the east and these United Nations armies moved rapidly toward each other? In that event the Nazis would be conquered, even if they did not capitulate.

The further we proceed and the more our military strategy unfolds, the more real becomes the possibility that there will be no V-Day, and that the enemy will be crushed piecemeal and in that manner beaten into

submission. One aspect of day to day developments is that the German people are learning that they are not invincible; that they are not a super-race; that Hitler and his fanatical associates have misled and lied to them from the start.

The German home front has not surrendered and will not surrender en masse and as a single unit because it cannot—what with bayonets pressed against their ribs every moment and the threat of summary execution for any who dare open their mouths.

Indications as of the moment are that the Reich will be crushed between the jaws of the relentless Allies vise closing from both the east and the west, and that the conquest will be accomplished in this manner, even as France was liberated by the juncture of American armies moving in from the channel coast and up from the Mediterranean beaches.

Gobbels may shout until he turns blue in the face, but his mouthings cannot stop the grinding force of the armies of free men. This time Germans will taste war and see war. Already they are having that experience. Maybe this is the best way, after all, to whip them into line and make them, if possible, to become a decent race in the decades to come.

Relief In Defeat

Britain thought the robot menace had been overcome when the buzz bomb coast was captured. But the Huns never give up; they must be overcome, and only in that way will the English people be able to breathe freely once and for all.

Ramps in the Calais area from which the flying explosives were launched have either been destroyed or captured. But the Germans are ordering them to within striking distance for release on an innocent civilian population.

These latter will become fewer as the enemy is driven farther inland. But this menace and that from the airplane bomb will not be entirely removed short of destruction of the Nazis. Complete relief will be possible only in and by defeat of the Huns.

FARM CONDITIONS RATED EXCELLENT

Raleigh, Sept. 18.—An appraisal of the farm situation as of the first of September shows that Tar Heel farmers have in prospect very-good-to-excellent crops of corn, peanuts, cotton, and tobacco, and a fair crop of hay.

Present indications, Collins said, are that North Carolina farmers will harvest larger-than-average crops of corn and hay this season, but the total volume of each crop will be less than last year. Corn production is now forecast at 50,353,000 bushels, or a yield of 21.5 bushels per acre on the 2,342,000 acres in corn cultivation.

Raleigh, Sept. 18.—North Carolina's peanut production for 1944, was estimated at 366,250,000 pounds as of September 1—19 percent larger than the 1943 crop of 368,040,000 pounds, or 73 percent larger than the 10-year average of 275,038,000 pounds, Statistician C. Z. Willis of the State Department of Agriculture reported.
