Women Jurors

Odds are that the State Supreme Court will decide the issue of women jurors in the affirmative when it rules on one or two cases coming up this fall. It can render its decision without respect to or influence of politics, either, and, it seems to us, plainly on the law.

When the suffrage amendment became part of the nation's organic law by being incorporated in the Constitution, it placed women on a par with men as to voting. And jurors are selected from the ranks of voters.

It has always been our theory that the practice was not general because it was not desired to require it, and because most women do not care for the responsibility. No doubt there are many women who would like to share in what would at first be a sort of innovation for them, but have never felt inclined to request that they be given the opportunity.

A provision in the State Constitution says conviction shall be by "good and lawful men," but there is some where in the canons of procedure an expression to the effect that trial of a defendant shall be by a "jury of his peers." That would "peers" admit of more than one interpretation, so that it would seem that the suffrage amendment would extend the function of jury duty to both sexes, despite the "good and lawful men" requirement, which was written into the organic law before the suffrage amendment was adopted.

Mixed juries in this State would create minor complications under some circumstances, but these might easily be overcome. In North Carolina it has seemed to be more that the good ladies simply did not care for the experience, and their supposed wishes have been respected by court authorities. As to legality, it is reasonable to presume that there are no obstacles. The Supreme Court's ruling will, nevertheless, be awaited with interest, and could have far-reaching results.

Picking New French Envoy Is Big Task

Washington, Sept. 16—As Allied victory prepares to take its last German hurdle in the march on Berlin, you begin to hear talk about the people who will represent the United States in Germany and France. And for that matter everywhere where the Allies have cleared out the Axis scourge.

It is to be expected that the United States diplomatic appointees to Germany will be civilian storm centers. (The nomination about the Murphy-Reber team for example.)

The choice for ambassador to Paris seems to be between those two old favorites, Anthony Drexel Biddle, extremely experienced ambassador-at-large to most of the once occupied countries, and Norman Armour, former United States representative to Uruguay.

Anthony, who did a brilliant job at Buenos Aires, was recently considered for the post of undersecretary of state, given to Edward Stettinius, Jr., when Sumner Welles resigned. He is now acting chief for Latin American relations.
