Near Million Pounds Leaf Are Offered

was comparatively narrow, with tops at around 47 cents and lower prices at about 35 cents.

Farmers apparently were well pleased with their sales and no burning of ears was reported.

Some estimates are that the Henderson market this year will sell between 25,000,000 and 30,000,000 pounds, and that the season pay-out will exceed \$10,000,000 for an all-time high in money.

The 1944 crop was increased twenty percent in acreage allotments or the AAA but increased growing seasons during the summer are believed to have produced more than twenty percent increase in actual pounds.

Henderson will compete with five warehouses this season, two less than last year, but there will be ample floor space for all offerings brought in by farmers.

The same number of warehouse companies are active on the market and with the same ownership personnel as before.

Official figures on today's sales are not expected to be available before Friday morning.

Farmers have been handicapped in raising the 1944 crop by reason of shortage of farm labor, and that scarcity is also hampering the buying and raising.

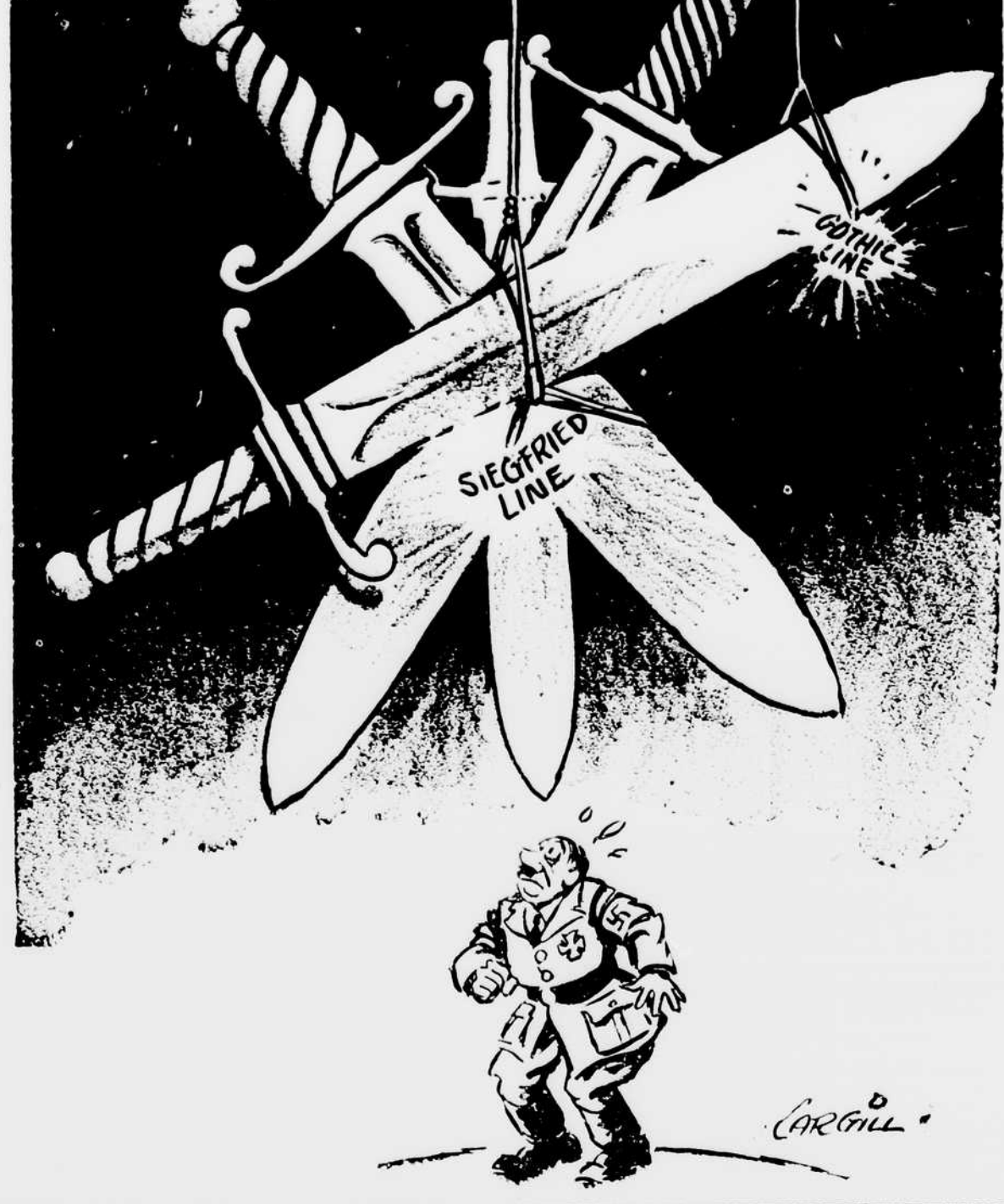
MEMBERS of Belgium's 'White Army' of patriots are placing this poster of 'Weeping Adolf' in scores of windows and on billboards.

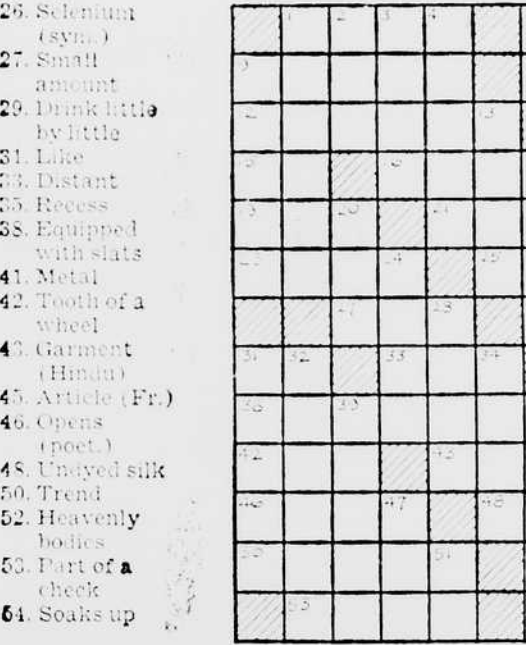
