**DON'T GET TOO GREEDY**  
ABILITY TO recognize a nice gift when it is offered, and the willingness to accept it instead of trying to multiply its size, should be part of the equipment of all astute bridge players. Use of a redouble, when you feel certain your side can make the contract which an opponent has doubled, is bad business when there are indications that they may have an "out" in the form of some suit they may bid if you frighten them.

So at 3-Spades it wound up. South was furious at his partner after he took ten tricks, with the loss of only one in hearts and two in clubs, though he should have been held to nine if West had opened clubs and repeated the suit twice for a ruff, instead of opening

his heart 2 in answer to East's bid of the suit.  
The main point of South's excitement, however, was North's lack of wisdom in re-opening after West had doubled South's 2-Spades. If he had been content to pass that, realizing it was a game contract, his side would have marked up a game and an extra trick or two.

North was just too happy to keep his mouth shut, however, after West doubled the spade bid, especially since his A-Q quite liberally sat over a guarded K held by the opponent. But he cancelled his own happiness by getting hoggy

### Bible Study Ends At Plank Chapel

The Woman's Society of Christian Service of Plank Chapel Methodist church at Bobbitt completed their annual Bible study course Sunday night. The general topic was "God, and the Problem of Suffering."

Mrs. Walton Smith was study chairman and directed the meetings. She also gave the introduction of the study book and discussed the first chapter and led the devotionals for two of the evenings. Mrs. P. C. Smith, Mrs. J. L. Fuller and Mrs. F. R. Smith presented the next three chapters, and Rev. R. G. Edwards concluded the study with the last two chapters, the topic being "Vicarious Suffering" and "The Fellowship of Suffering." He stated that only a suffering Saviour could reach the hearts of and redeem suffering humanity.

At one of the sessions Mrs. Thad Woodruff favored the group and added meaning to the lesson with a solo "In the Hour of Trial, Jesus, Lead For Me."  
The study was further highlighted with the devotionals of Miss Adelle Young and Mrs. U. B. Alexander. The general ideas presented by her coincided with the general topic and the sub-topics of all six chapters. Miss Young gave a number of Bible verses, and several readings which touched on the subject of vicarious suffering, including the sufferings of Jesus; and the fellowship there is in suffering with others. Mrs. Alexander averred that suffering was not sent as a punishment for sin (although it often comes as a result of sin) but aid there was a higher purpose. When it does come as a result of sin, it should serve as a warning—just a physical pain gives notice that something is wrong and should be righted. Various kinds of suffering comes to others when it is not the result of any wrongdoing. Such increase strength, if surmounted, raise above them and go on their way and reach the goal. She based her remarks on the following three Bible verses: "If you suffer with Him, you shall also be glorified with Him"; "My light afflictions which are but for a moment, worketh for me a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory"; "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him (or takes up His cross and follows Him) shall not perish but have everlasting life." She concluded by saying "let us press on toward the mark for the prize, and so run that we may obtain." This was followed with the song "Am I a Soldier of The Cross?" and an earnest prayer for all who

suffer.  
At the last session of the "school" a rising vote of thanks was extended to our capable and faithful study leader, and she in turn thanked all who shared the work and helped to make the study a success.

## Wake Forest Enrollment Reaches 531

Wake Forest, Sept. 21. With a freshman class of more than 200 and a total registration of 531, all citizens, Wake Forest College has begun its 114th session. The enrollment is already 52 percent greater than that of last session, and will probably exceed 600 before they are all in.

There are 90 young women and a number of war veterans who have enrolled at Wake Forest under the GI rehabilitation program. They come from various theatres. One of them is Cox J. Hayes of Henderson, an ex-marine who was wounded in Tarawa. He is registered for pre-law.

Among the coeds is Mary Ida May of Snow Hill who last summer appeared as a soloist in a special feature at Carnegie Hall, New York N. Y., being accompanied by the North Carolina Symphonic Orchestra.

President Thurman Kitchen at the opening of the college welcomed the new students as "citizens of the campus and community." He told them that "college is a miniature world. The way you act and the contributions you make to college life form a good index of the kind of world citizen you will make."

"Citizenship carries with it obligations and responsibilities as well as opportunities. I hope your citizenship will be of a positive nature—not just a neutral citizen; that is that you will make an active contribution to some phase of college life."

## B. P. W. Is Planning For Its Next Paper Drive

Now that the paper drive put on by the American Legion has come to a successful finish, the Business and Professional Women's club is already making plans for the regular drive to be held five weeks from now, the club announced today.

H. B. Lucy, trouble shooter for paper salvage, visited the club last week and reported that, in spite of all the drives, there still remains a very acute shortage of materials for the making of packages for overseas articles. Unless there is a decided increase in paper salvage,

paper bags and cartons will be a thing of the past as far as civilians are concerned, he further stated.

Next month will be a fine time for saving salvage, as it is not yet time for winter fires to take their toll of paper, members of the club stated. It has been estimated that the amount of paper that comes into the average home reaches 10 pounds a week, the greater part of which can be salvaged.

The public is asked now to begin saving their waste paper, so that every scrap saved may go to war just as the boys of Vance county are going to war.
