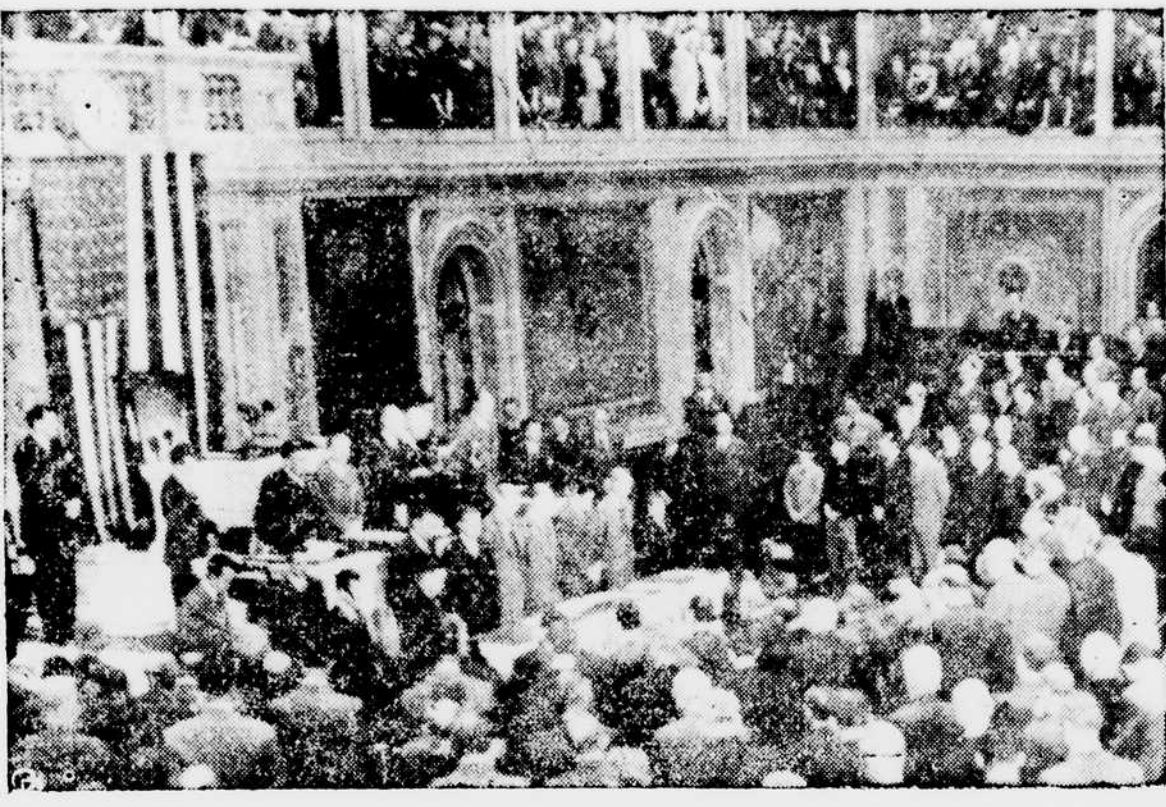


As House Began Work In The 79th Congress

U. S. Carrier Plane Attack Stepped Up

Most Concentrated Blows of Pacific Likely Under Way

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Pearl Harbor, Jan. 5—(AP)—The crushing might of U. S. third fleet carrier aircraft, whose deep penetration of enemy waters has Japan warning of major war developments, may have fallen for the third straight day on Formosa and the Ryukyus.

An ominous radio blackout today by the fleet strongly suggested that possibility. Hitting two strongholds at once, indicating even greater striking power than that shown on separate days against the same target last October, the carrier planes struck Tuesday and Wednesday, Admiral Nimitz confirmed in a communique which said the details "are not yet available."

The circumstances surrounding the present attack are such that the most concentrated air-attack blows of the Pacific war may well be in progress. Last October, when the way was cleared for re-invasion of the Philippines, the carriers had the responsibility of knocking out the enemy air force in the Philippines ahead of General MacArthur's Leyte-bound transports.

News from newly won and developed land bases on Leyte and Mindoro, Mr. Arthur's planes are continuing to pound Luzon island, forcing the enemy to use their power against Formosa and the Ryukyus.
