RED DRIVE NEARS SOUTH GERMANY



ALONG A 600-MILE FRONT from Budapest to the Baltic Sea, the huge Russian winter drive is under way with the main push headed for the ancient Polish capital of Krakow (1) and southern Germany. North of Warsaw (2) the offensive was reported from East Prussia and to the south. At the southern end of the push, pressure north of Budapest toward Vienna continues while (3) important gains were being made in the drive now penetrating Czechoslovakia. (International)

Paris, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Fresh and posted British troops, in a resumption of the Allied offensive, have gained 1,000 yards, crossed the little Roode river at two points and driven into the village of Dieteren, 23 miles above Aachen, and still were progressing today through the icy ground haze.

The British captured at least one bridge over the Roode intact as they advanced through a relatively soft soil in German defenses. British divisions in the attack had not been engaged in the battle of the Belgian bulge, now reduced to about a fourth of its original size.

The little Dutch town of Dieteren is two miles from the German frontier and six north of Sittard. The British appeared to be driving toward the Roode river on the left bank of the U. S. 9th army, which guards its banks from Limburg to Schmidt.

The fog which shrouded the attack of infantry and tanks also slowed the progress of the British, who could hardly see their Luddies along the assault line. Roads were glazed with ice and sleet this morning. Luftwaffe Cam all were massive German mine fields, planted during the three months lull.

Soviets Push Deep Across Poland On Toward Nazi Border

London, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Moscow, in a broadcast recorded by the Soviet monitor, announced tonight the capture of Warsaw. A Berlin broadcast tonight admitted the loss of Warsaw, saying it had been "evacuated." The ravaged capital of Poland, once a proud and beautiful city of 1,300,000, fell to the first White Russian army group of Marshal Gregory Zhukov. Marshal Stalin said in an order of the day. Great sections of the city lay in ruins. It was the tomb of thousands of Poles killed since the battle started last July.

London, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The Polish provisional government at Lublin triumphantly announced today the liberation of Warsaw, the bloody and ruined city which was the first national capital engulfed by the Germans in this war.

The announcement, broadcast by the Polish regime (established last December 31 at Lublin, and immediately recognized by Moscow, Germany and the United States), said that Warsaw had been captured. Paratroopers of the first army and Polish units have liberated Warsaw, the capital of the Polish republic.

The last word from Moscow was that Warsaw had been overtaken on the southwest by Soviet winter offensives. But Moscow may have designated the Lublin government to announce the liberation of Warsaw, since it is one but fearless uprising by the Polish underground last July.
