Prisoners In Rome Escape In Disorders

Rome, March 7.—(AP)—Disorders spread to the Regina Coeli prison as sporadic bomb explosions throughout Rome punctuated Italy's political crisis today.

Following yesterday's clash before the royal palace between carabinieri and a crowd in which a communist demonstrator was killed, convicts and persons awaiting trial for fascist crimes burst out of their antiquated cells in the prison before dawn. Police and firemen quelled the riot with tear gas.

Bombs burst sporadically in various sections of the capital and crowds were reported to have demonstrated before carabinieri in outlying sections.

House Group Demands End Lend-Lease

Washington, March 7.—(AP)—The House Foreign Affairs Committee today expressed in blunt terms its insistence that lend-lease end when the war is won.

Apparently moving to offset Republican-expressed fears that the program might become a vehicle of postwar reconstruction in Europe, the committee said:

"When the war has been won, lend-lease should end and be liquidated as promptly and efficiently as possible."

The statement was attached to the committee-approved legislation extending lend-lease one year beyond its present June 30 expiration date, and validating contracts made under the act until June 30, 1949.

Brigadeheads Cross Oder At Kustrin

Violent Barrage Is Laid Down Prior To Starting of Attack

London, March 7.—(AP)—A Berlin broadcast said today the Russians had launched a large-scale attack on Berlin from both sides of Kustrin on the Oder after a 24-hour artillery barrage.

Kustrin is on the Oder 36 miles due east of Berlin. By German account, the 1st White Russian army has forged bridgeheads over the river both north and south of the city.

Moscow dispatches made no mention of the Berlin-Oder front, but said Soviet troops were sweeping across Wolin, the first stepping stone island in Stettin bay to the north, in a push aimed at cutting off Stettin from the sea.

They captured the city of Wollin, 23 miles north of Stettin, on the coastal road leading to the U-boat base of Sonnenhafen, and beyond Germany's Mecklenburg province north.

The Berlin radio said a Russian artillery barrage is raining down on German positions on the Oder; "this barrage preceded their all-out offensive on this front."

A Transcaucasian brigadier and Marshal Gregory Zhukov's army fought a long-battled Kustrin to win, jumping off ground for a drive on Berlin on the Oder's west bank."

The assault extended southward toward Frankfurt, 16 miles up the river.

A half-fledged Soviet offensive from the east on Berlin has been awaited for weeks. The first Ukrainian army is poised west of the Oder on Zhukov's southern flanks.

State Nears End Rebuttal Charges In Meadows Case

Greenville, March 7.—(AP)—The State neared the end of its rebuttal testimony today in the trial of Dr. Leon Meadows, charged with embezzlement and false pretenses in connection with his handling of special and student funds as president of Eastern Carolina Teachers College.

R. G. Dayton, of Raleigh, assistant director of the State budget, said that during the ten-year period ended in 1944, the college had returned \$169,500 in unexpended appropriation.

The State put S. T. Neely, William Dawson Smith, Hoy Cherry, and William Shiver, on the stand for brief testimony. Cherry and Shiver said they had done some work on Meadows' private property, and the State tried to show that Meadows had charged the payments against the college.

Senate Ponders Drafting Of Married Nurses

Washington, March 7.—(AP)—A decision whether nurses who may be drafted for armed service duty should include married women faced the Senate today. It is one of the major barriers to passage of the first women's draft legislation ever to reach the floors of Congress. Once it is hurdled the House expects to send the measure to a Senate already leaning to a co-equal manpower bill.

Unfinished business headed today's docket included an amendment by Representative Elton Rementer, Ohio, to strike from the pending bill a section limiting the proposed nurses-draft to unmarried women not over 43 or under 26. Should it be adopted another amendment deferring women with children is expected to be offered.

Luzon Fight Is Entering Final Phase

U. S. Units Regroup To Kill Nipponese Sneaking In Hills

Manila, March 7.—(AP)—The final assault column for Luzon—tasked to capture the Japanese more than 100 days after the initial phase?—General MacArthur said today.

With Manila liberated, Britain and Commonwealth forces and the central Luzon assault over, the remaining rear guard, 10,000 men, are moving from York's vassals committed to the operation from the United States Sixth and Eighth armies are planning to go after scattered Japanese in the mountains.

Final Drive Begun To Wipe Out Japs Entrenched On Two

U. S. Pacific Fleet Headquarters, Tokyo, March 7.—(AP)—An all-out push against the 6,000 men of Japanese entrenched on the rocky northern end of Iwo Jima was under way today, with tremendous artillerу support and army fighters robbing the southern ridge for the last time. These fighters are based within flying range of Tokyo.

The ground over, breaking a two-day comparative lull in this fierce battle of the Pacific war, achieved small gains yesterday in the center and on the left flank of their Marine line encircling the officially resisting enemy against the northern hill.
