

Game Plans To Call For \$5 Millions

Raleigh, April 12.—A long time plan for development of game and fish in North Carolina after the war has been prepared and submitted by the Department of Conservation and Development. A new small game and fish resource center will be established at a state laboratory and research center. This project will require a thousand acres of land, suitable laboratory and residential buildings, 20 or more ponds and other essential facilities.

Various wildlife areas will be provided or enlarged and perhaps new ones added. These include parks for all sections of the state, sports fields and game, with special attention to migratory waterfowl areas along the coast and trout fishing in the mountains.

Appropriate additional land cooperation with the Federal Game and Fish Commission is an essential part of the program.

State strength and resources will be used to develop and maintain a working and an overall program of development. The plan will call for a total of \$5,000,000 over a period of five years.

Elliott Roosevelt Flying To U. S. For Father's Funeral

London, April 12.—(AP)—Brigadier-General Elliott Roosevelt set out for Washington today by air and expected to arrive in time for his father's funeral Saturday.

Commander of an eighth air force photo reconnaissance wing, he was visiting friends in London when he heard the news in the midnight broadcast by NBC. Another officer said he was stunned and sat quietly for some time then repeated over and over, "It just can't be true."

Young Roosevelt returned to his headquarters, called a meeting of his staff at 3 a. m. and informed them he was leaving in one hour for Washington. He was able to make connections on a special army plane leaving this morning.

Stocks Firm During Day

New York, April 12.—(AP)—Stocks were firm during the day, with the Dow Jones Industrial Average closing at 128.46, up 1.14 points from 127.32.

The market was buoyed by news that the Federal Reserve Board had raised the discount rate to 6 1/2 percent, the highest since 1933. The move was expected and had little effect on the market.

Other news included reports that the War Relocation Authority had received \$10,000,000 from the War Relocation Authority for the purpose of providing relief for Japanese-Americans.
