

County Quota \$1,302,000 For 7th War Loan Drive

Mayor Powell Will Be Chairman; Quota Exceeds Last Drive

Mayor Henry Powell, who has been named chairman of the seventh war loan drive for Vance county, announced today that the county's quota would be \$1,302,000 for the drive, as compared with a goal of \$1,176,000 in the sixth war loan last fall, and which was over-subscribed by almost one hundred percent.

The county's "E" bond total for the seventh loan will be \$466,000, or nearly double the \$288,000 in the sixth loan. "E" bond totals are included in the overall figures of the quota, and are not separate.

The State's quota is \$134,000,000 in the coming campaign or more than the \$121,000,000 in the sixth loan. The new "E" bond quota for the State is \$55,000,000, as against \$54,000,000 last fall.

Mayor Powell said today he expected to have his organization completed by next week, at which time he will announce the personnel.

City and county chairmen will be named as will one also for the women's division, and perhaps one also for the colored section.

The seventh loan drive will officially begin on Monday, May 14, and will run through the month of June. All purchases at the present time, however, apply to the quota.

Vance county has never failed to meet its quota on all war drives, and leaders are hopeful that past records will be duplicated at this time. Mayor Powell headed the fifth war loan in the spring of 1944. The sixth loan, which was nearly doubled in quota, was led by J. W. Sanders.

AROUND CAPITOL SQUARE

Raleigh, April 20.—Hinton James, state game commissioner, left Thursday night to attend a two-day meeting of the Southeastern Game Commissioners Association at Atlanta, Ga., where most of the discussion was expected to revolve around coordination of state regulations and cooperation with the federal wild life service with respect to open seasons and hunting rules for doves and migratory waterfowl. James is secretary and treasurer of the association, which includes Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky.

STUDY—In addition to general discussion of the problems, James said he would request the federal wild life agency to make a study of the causes for fewer ducks coming to eastern Carolina this year. Reports from Ducks Unlimited, principal breeding ground in Canada and sometimes called the "duck factory," indicated as many fowls last season as ever before, but fewer of them came to their usual haunts along the Carolina coast. One suggested reason is the military activity in the air over the area, but that is speculation. The state commissioner wants something more definite—hence the request for thorough study of the situation.

PLANNERS—Another sectional meeting at which North Carolina will be represented is the South-wide Planning Conference at Birmingham on May 18. This conference is outgrowth of a movement started by former Governor Broughton for concerted action among southern states in postwar development along all lines. More than a year ago the State of North Carolina sponsored a series of newspaper advertisements signed by Governor Broughton promoting such a plan, and the Birmingham conference was called by Governor Robert Kerr of Oklahoma, chairman of the southern conference. Governor Cherry has designated Paul Kelly, assistant director of conservation and development; Clyde A. Erwin, state superintendent of public instruction, and Frank Sasser, chief veterans' service officer, to represent North Carolina at the meeting.

Vacancy On City Council To Be Filled

Incumbent Members All File Names For Election Of May 1

At their regular monthly meeting for April next Monday night, members of the Henderson City Council will elect a new member of that body to succeed the late T. H. Crabtree, alderman from the first ward. Mayor Henry Powell said today the man selected will fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Crabtree, which still had a year to run at the time of his death earlier this week.

Meantime, four members of the Council, in addition to the mayor, whose terms expire this spring, have all filed for reelection, and as of today no opposition had developed for either of them. Saturday is the final date for filing if a candidate's name is to appear on the printed ballot. The election will be held on Tuesday, May 1.

Three members of the Council held over for another year of their year terms to which they were elected in 1944.

No opposition for any of those whose terms expire at this time has been heard, and it appeared today that there would be none.
