Polish Military Leader Professes New Government

London, July 12.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Anders, who was appointed by the Polish exile government in London last February as commander of an Polish army, sea and air forces abroad, issued an order of the day today protesting Allied recognition of the new Warsaw provisional government.

Anders' action followed by 24 hours a similar order of the day issued by Major General Binkiewicz, commander of the first Polish army division in Germany, declaring his continued allegiance to the president of the exiled regime.

The statement by Anders, who is now in Italy, was released through Polish headquarters in London. D. Kwasniewski, head of the Warsaw government as a "heavy blow." An

Chinese Exploit Gains Over Japs East of Luichow

Chongqing, July 12.—(AP)—Chinese forces advancing northward along the Hunan-Kwangsi railway were reported today to be battling their way toward Yenchow, 600 miles northeast of Luichow, and 12 miles southwest of the Chinese United States air base at Kweilin.

The Chinese high command said this column had recaptured Luichow, 28 miles northeast of Luichow, and had driven on beyond.
