\$5,000,000,000 Loan To Britain Favored By U. S.

Would Be Made at Low Interest Rate, Without 'Strings'

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—American officials working out plans to help Britain were reported today to favor a loan of \$5,000,000,000. It would be at a very low interest rate and without strings as to where the money could be spent.

Whether a plan along this line finally is given to Congress will depend on Anglo-American talks and formal acceptance of the idea by the London and Washington governments.

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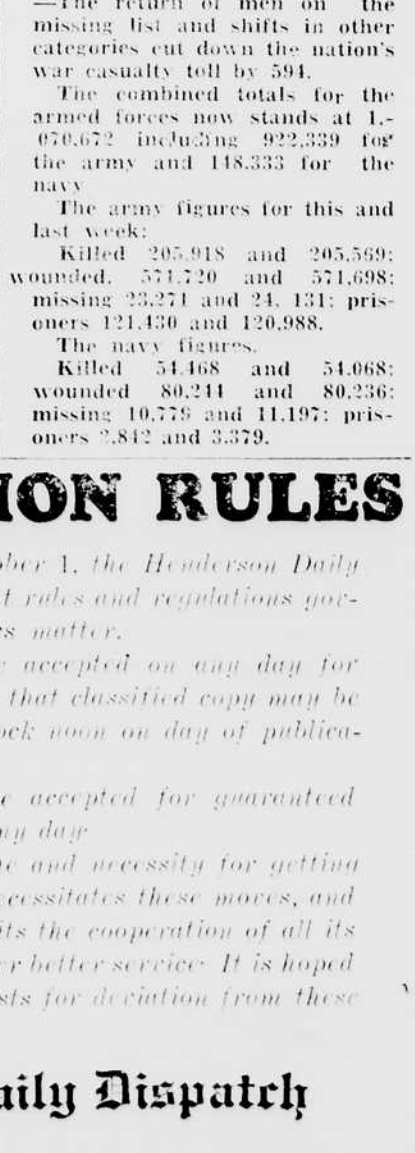
