In Durham Soon

Durham, Oct. 16.—Dr. Alton Ochsner, head of the department of surgery in the school of medicine of Tulane University, New Orleans; J. Louis Neff, New York, executive director of the American Cancer Society; Mrs. Lucy R. Milligan, New York, national commander of the field army of the American Cancer Society and Mrs. Horace B. Ritchie, Athens, Ga., regional commander of the field army, will headline the list of distinguished medical and lay leaders in cancer control who participate in the three-day regional meeting of the American Cancer Society's southeast region.

The meeting which will bring together persons prominent in the American Cancer Society and its field army from states from Virginia to Kentucky to Texas, will open on October 22 and continue through October 24, according to an announcement by Dr. Ivan M. Proctor, Raleigh, executive committee chairman and Mrs. George E. Marshall, Mount Airy, state commander of the North Carolina division of the field army of the American Cancer Society. The Washington Duke hotel will be headquarters, but part of the sessions will be held at Duke university hospital and at the school of public health of the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill.

Mrs. Ritchie, who is being assisted by Dr. Ochsner, Dr. Proctor, and Mrs. Marshall in developing the program, says that the meeting will give attention to both professional and lay aspects of the fight on cancer. Members of the medical profession throughout North Carolina are invited.
