Magazine Predicts 400,000 Private Aircraft By 1955

In 1955, American will have 400-
000 privately owned airplanes in
constant use, and the aviation in-
dustry will be three times as big as
it was in 1939, according to a re-
port on government reports, is made
today by the magazine Flying.
Whereas prewar airlines carried
only 15 per cent as many passen-
gers as Pullman trains, by 1955
they'll be carrying half as many, and
at least 600,000 persons will be em-
ployed in various phases of aviation,
Flying further predicts.
These figures, the magazine points
out, are more conservative than most
which have been brought out by
other surveys.
With full employment, there will
be 2,800,000 families which can af-
ford airplanes in 1955. With airport
development, extensive pilot train-
ing, lowered purchase and mainte-
nance costs and increased safety, the
figure of 400,000 planes in use
should be easily reached, says the
magazine. This figure would include
280,000 for personal use and busi-
ness travel, 50,000 owned by busi-
ness organizations, and 50,000 for
crop dusting, photography and other
commercial purposes.

Scott Funeral Fridays.

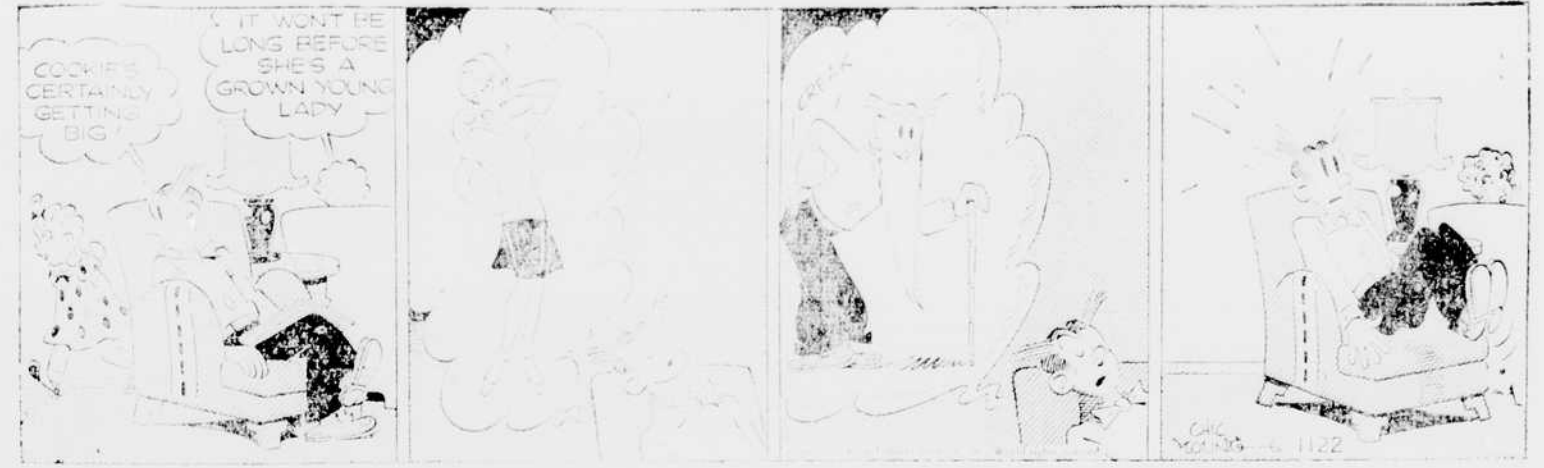
Funeral services for Levi Scott,

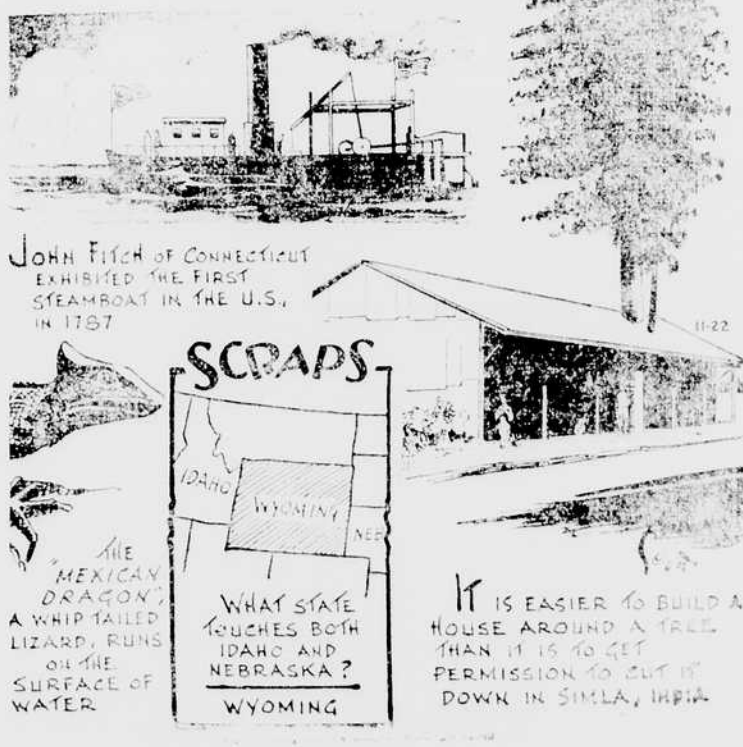

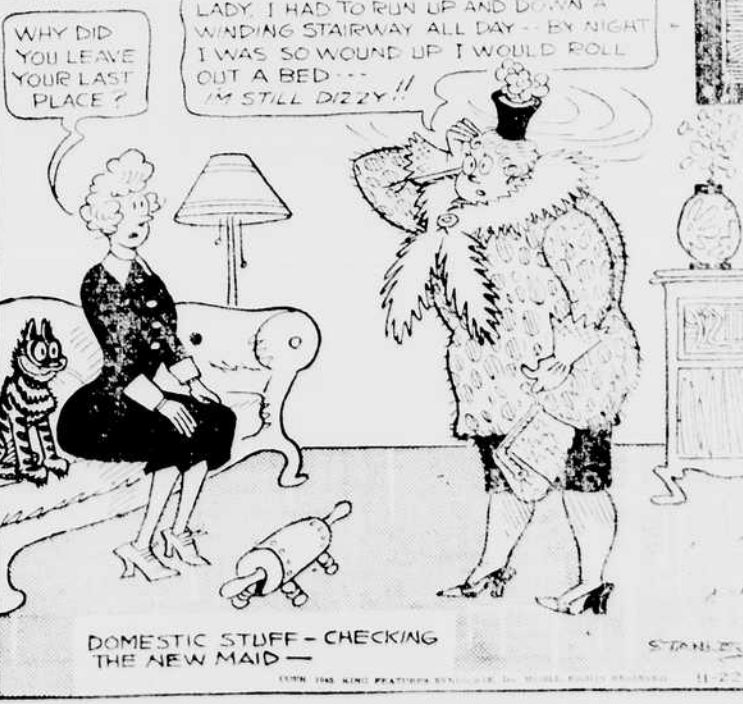

SEPARATE TRUMPS NEAT

SOME OF THE NEATEST PLAY to watch is that in which a suit dealer uses a lot of his trumps separately, ridding tricks with one trump at a time and never using two of them on a single trick. This can require adroit management, perhaps winding up with a situation in which one of the two hold-ings has only a couple of trumps left, and the opposite one is trumpless. To make that succeed may necessitate having a certain defender in the lead at just the right time when the lead is made to the next to last trick, or else have some missing guarded trump honor in the hand of the desired defender.
