

Busy Year Is Reported For Lions

Outstanding committee reports and a talk by C. H. Wolfe, superintendent at Greystone Quatry Company, were given at the first meeting in 1946 for the Lions club last night at Vance hotel.

George Hooker, chairman of the citizenship and patriotism committee, reported that 146 toys were distributed by the committee to children during Christmas. Members of the club had collected used toys and repaired them for Christmas gifts. He also stated that a wreath was placed beneath the memorial plaque at the underpass in honor of Vance men killed in service in

World War II.

Lions club members purchased 229 bonds during the Victory loan drive, amounting to \$19,000. J. L. Seal, chairman of the bond committee, reported. Will Mitchell, chairman of the attendance committee, reported that during the first six months of 1945 club members were 100 percent in attendance.

E. H. Dixon, Jr., was in charge of the program and presented Mr. Wolfe, who explained the process of crushing rock and told of the activities of the Greystone company.

Since the beginning of the quarry in 1916, the company has shipped 11,685,000 tons of stone, Mr. Wolfe stated. The hole from which the stone has been excavated now covers 15 acres and at its deepest part measures 210 feet with an average depth of 180 feet.

Fifty percent of the crushed rock is shipped to railroads, 40 percent to highways, five percent to the government and five percent to miscellaneous, he stated.

Two new members, Ernest G. Harrison and John Norwood, were welcomed and presented Lions but-

ton by Melvin Johnson.

It was announced that a director's meeting will be held Monday night, January 7, at seven o'clock at the Vance hotel, with T. J. Harrington and W. L. Wilson as hosts.

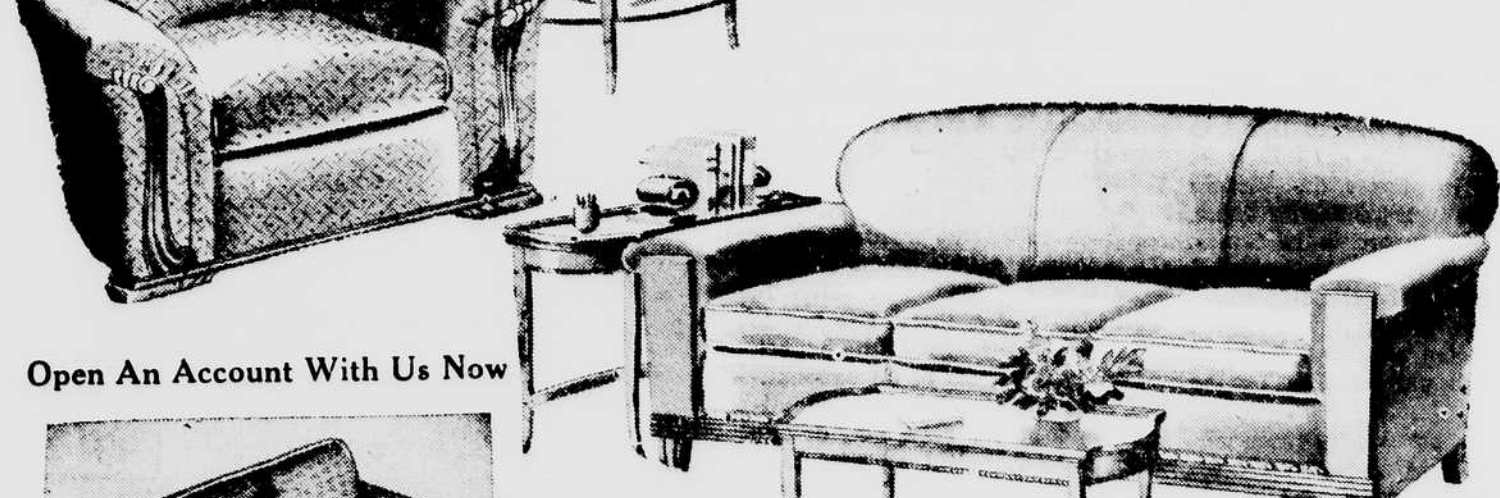
