Community Digging Out From Sleet-Snow Storm

Traffic Is Again Moving, With Roads Partially Cleared

Under a bright sun yesterday and today, with temperatures moderating considerably, this city and vicinity today were digging out from the sleet and snow which fell Wednesday afternoon and all Wednesday night for the worst storm of the kind here in years.

But the experience left its trail behind. It was a long story of suffering and inconvenience, particularly with respect to traffic.

Bus service was in operation again today after having been suspended early Wednesday evening and not resumed in some instances until Thursday afternoon. Two north-bound buses failed to depart, were stopped here Wednesday night, stranding passengers for hours, and private cars were warned by highway patrolmen and local officers not to try to proceed, and this swelled the number of homeless people to a large number. Local hotels were unable to take in more than a few persons, and many spent the night in hotel basins, and in the case of railroad passenger terminals, floors in tourist hotels were crowded with all taken.

In the city, street department equipment cleared traffic lanes and many streets, but sidewalks were still clogged with snow and sleet, except in the business section and elsewhere where property owners or tenants shoveled out a path.
