out your prospects. Exercises for Periodic Pain

By HERMAN N. PUNDESEN, M.D.

IT HAS been reported that four to five of every ten women in the childbearing age between eighteen and forty-five years suffer from pain during their menstrual periods and that about one-sixth of such warmen are seriously handicanned during this time as a result. This represents a large loss in time from work and, of course, interference with other activities.

A great deal of effort has been made to determine the various causes for such difficulties and to devise methods of treatment. Among the various causes suggested are mechanical disturbances, nervous disorders, allergy or oversensitivity, and perhaps trouble with the glands of internal secretion such as the thyroid gland in the neck or the sex glands.

Study Made Doctor John O. Haman of Brookline, Massachusetts, has made a study of 129 women between the ages of 15 and 37 years. He divided the patients into two groups. The first included those in whom pain occurred with the first period they had or within four started several hours to two to three days before the periods in

Second Group In the second group the women had painful periods but the pain did not follow the same course de-

scribed above for the first group. Doctor Haman also graded the patients in the first group into three classes: those in whom the pain was so severe that the patient had to go to bed; those who found it necessary to take some medicine for relief but were not confined to bed; and those in whom the discomfort was not severe enough to require taking drugs for relief.

Doctor Haman treated all of the patients by having them carry out certain exercises. These could be done at home and only had to be employed for two or three months before improvement occurred. Nearly 85 per cent. of all the patients treated obtained at least some relief. In the first group nine years thereafter. The discomfort out of every ten were benefited.
