

Boy Scout Week To Be Observed During Week

Extensive Program Mapped For White And Colored Units

"Scouts of the World — Building Together" is the theme Henderson Boy Scouts will observe during the annual Boy Scout Week, which also coincides with observance of their thirty-sixth anniversary. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of Scout principles in building a world torn apart by war.

To promote international friendships, and to help get Scouting started again, Boy Scouts of the county will send out grown uniforms and equipment to Scouts overseas in a "Shirts — Off — Backs" campaign. Scouts here will attach their names and addresses to the articles sent.

The Occaneechee council will lay special stress on the "good turn" idea in Scouting, with Boy Scouts helping in every way they can in their homes, schools, churches and in the city.

Tentative arrangements for Boy Scout Week call for a special Court of Honor to be announced by Rev. Roy Holder, chairman of the advancement committee. John Falkner will be decorated as an Eagle Scout either during Scout Week or shortly afterwards, it was announced.

Boy Scouts will attend church in a body next Sunday and a special session will be given in their homes.

Colored troops in the city will observe the week by holding their annual Scouters banquet on Wednesday night at the graded school, Roy Lines, of Raleigh, who succeeds Claude Humphreys as executive of the Occaneechee council, will be the guest of honor. The secretary of the North Carolina Colored Teachers Association will be the main speaker. Rev. E. Norfleet Gardner, chairman of Vance district inter-racial committee, will represent that committee at the banquet.

W. E. Gurnes is chairman of the colored division.

District Chairman C. O. Seibert is planning a special meeting of the Vance county district executive committee with Roy Lines, who officially takes office on February 11.

Troop 41 of the First Baptist church is also planning a special activity under direction of R. W. Elbert, Scoutmaster, details of which have not been announced.

Other Scout troops will also be active during the week and a number of store windows are expected to be decorated to call attention to Boy Scout Week.

Schools Receive \$1,560 Cafe Fund

High School Here, Three In County Furnished Money

One city and three rural schools will share a total of \$1,560.27 in State and Federal funds by reason of participation in the child-feeding program. Superintendent E. M. Rollins announced today. He said he had received a check for that amount for November expenses.

Henderson high school cafeteria will get \$275.04; Aycock, \$409.14; Zeb Vance, \$455.76; and Middleburg, \$330.30.

These are the only schools in the county which are participating in the program at the present time. Mr. Rollins said. The funds will be applied toward school lunches served at the school.

Heavy Week-End Rains Again Cripple Schools

Suspension is For Indefinite Period; Rainfall 1.90 ins.

As a result of further heavy rains during the week-end, rural schools in Vance county were again interrupted in their routine schedules because school buses could not get through over dangerous roads. Superintendent E. M. Rollins announced today. City schools were not affected and were operating, with about normal attendance.

Townsville school, in the northern part of the county, which has run hardly any since Christmas, except for the last three days of last week, including Saturday, was again forced to close today. Dabney, which has been able to have classes only intermittently this year, was also affected. Suspensions in both instances were for an "indefinite" period, until further orders from the superintendent's office.

Middleburg, Aycock and Zeb Vance schools were operating; more or less as usual, it was stated.

Rainfall during 24 hours from 6 p. m. Saturday to 6 p. m. Sunday amounted to 1.90 inches, according to announcement by the official Weather Bureau observer. This heavy precipitation produced conditions on rural highways of about the same character that preceded the sunny days of last week.

Some rural roads have become almost impassable for regular traffic, and residents in some areas say appeals to highway authorities have brought no relief. They have personally tried trucks to beat crushed stone to fill in mud holes in some cases so as to make roads passable and permit them to get to town and back to their homes.

ANDREW C. ALLGOOD IS BURIED SUNDAY

Services in Elmwood Cemetery For Former Resident Who Died Friday In Richmond

Andrew Cowles Allgood, 77, former superintendent of the Henderson Cotton Mill, many years ago, and who died last Friday in Richmond, Va., was buried in Elmwood cemetery here, with services at the graveside, Rev. Roy Holder, pastor of Holy Innocents Episcopal church, conducted the services. Pallbearers were selected from among friends of the deceased.

He had been in declining health about a week and on Friday was taken to a hospital, where he died within a few hours. He had lived in Richmond the past ten years. He was a native of Winston-Salem and was born September 21, 1868.

Mr. Allgood was for many years a member of the Baptist church at Vaughan.

Surviving are five daughters, Misses Edna, Eva, Beulah and Florence Allgood, all of Durham, and Mrs. John W. Leggett of Scotland Neck; one son, J. C. Allgood, of Durham; two sisters, Mrs. Emma Jones and Miss Sophia Allgood, of Johnston; his wife died three years ago and is buried in Elmwood cemetery here.

N. C. State Man Urges Growing Of Hybrid Corn Here

Only four to five percent of corn grown in North Carolina is being planted to hybrid varieties, while 75 to 100 percent grown in the middle western corn belt states is of hybrid character, Dr. A. D. Stewart, associate research professor of agronomy at N. C. State College, declared at a discussion on hybrid corn seed production held at the county agent's office Friday.

There is a great need for additional hybrid corn producers, and it is hoped that a number of farmers will take up the production of that seed, Dr. Stewart stated. During the last year, the former is asked to make a test project, growing the corn under supervision of the N. C. Crop Improvement Association. After that time, he is approved as a regular breeder of hybrid corn seed.
