## Prater Violet

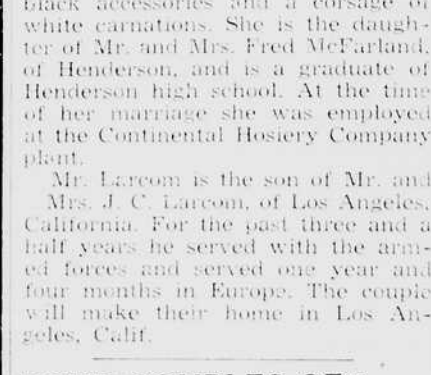
