Red Cross Drive Here Shaping Up

Workers are being organized in preparation for the annual drive for funds for the American Red Cross, and lists should be completed in a few days, Sam Alford, who will head the campaign, said today. Alford is Red Cross county chairman also.

The drive is to begin on Tuesday, March 12, and it is hoped that the entire \$7.75 quota will be subscribed by the end of that week. The goal is considerably less than half of what was asked in 1945 or 1944. A substantial portion of the amount will, as usual, be retained by the local chapter for the program in this county.

Advance gift workers will make their calls in advance of the start of general soliciting. Purpose of this preliminary effort will be to reach large contributors first.

The county has always exceeded its allotment for the Red Cross, and during the war years went sharply above the goal. The much smaller total this year is expected to be raised more easily than formerly, even though there is no stimulus of a war in progress to provide the incentive.

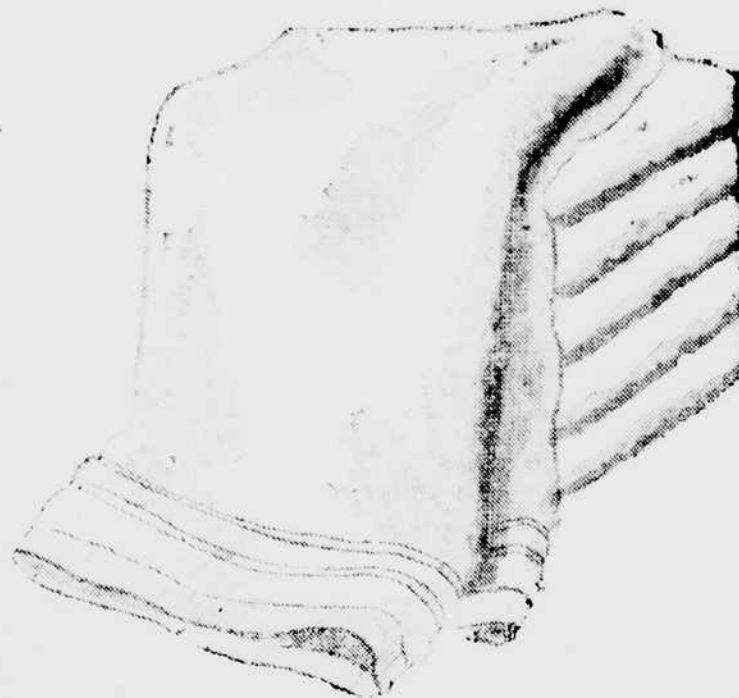


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
