## Library Adds New Books Appropriate For Easter

Among the new books at the H. Leslie Perry Memorial Library are a number which will make good reading during the approaching Lenten season.

"I'd is Not Dead", by Bernard Liddin Bell, presents the spiritual rebirth of the average man.

"Great Writers as Interpreters of Religion" is by Dr. Edwin Mims, Professor Emeritus of English Literature of Vanderbilt University. In this book Dr. Mims has set down the essence of his teachings for half a century in the religious message in our literary heritage. In the classic writings not only of approved Christians like Milton, Bunyan, Carlyle, and Browning, but also of the indifferent Shakespeare, the atheist Shelley and the doubting Arnold he has ever emphasized passages that are in-lined revelations of the great ideas and emotions of the spiritual world.

"Thy Health Shall Spring Forth," by Russell Dieks, is a book of courage and good cheer containing helpful and stimulating prayers and meditations.

"A Book of Comfort" is an anthology which contains poems and extracts selected from the works of outstanding American and British poets and authors and from the Bible.

## Assault, Vagrancy Cases Are Tried In Police Court

Several cases of assault and vagrancy were tried by Mayor Henry I. Howell in police court today.

Julian Southerland, colored, was tried for assault with a deadly weapon on Felix Anderson and for damaging his physical property. He was sentenced to 90 days, commitment not to issue upon condition that the defendant pay five dollars and costs, \$7.50 to be added to costs for use of Anderson, and further condition that the defendant remain of good behavior for two years.

Barley Green King, white, tried for vagrancy, was sentenced to 30 days, suspended upon payment of costs and on condition that he not go near the railroad or bus depot in the next two years unless he has a ticket.

Anna Sykes and Dorothy Perry, colored, were charged with assault and a deadly weapon each other. The defendants were found to be minors and the cases were remanded to juvenile court.
