Final tabulation showed 8,139 votes cast, of 20,468 eligible. Of the 8,139 polled, slightly more than 600 were voided by errors in use of the voting machines; 5,505 opposed inclusion of Greenwich in the UNO area, and 2.019 favored inclusion. Friends of UNO were cheered by the light vote.
