Negroes Tried For Getting Suit On False Pretense

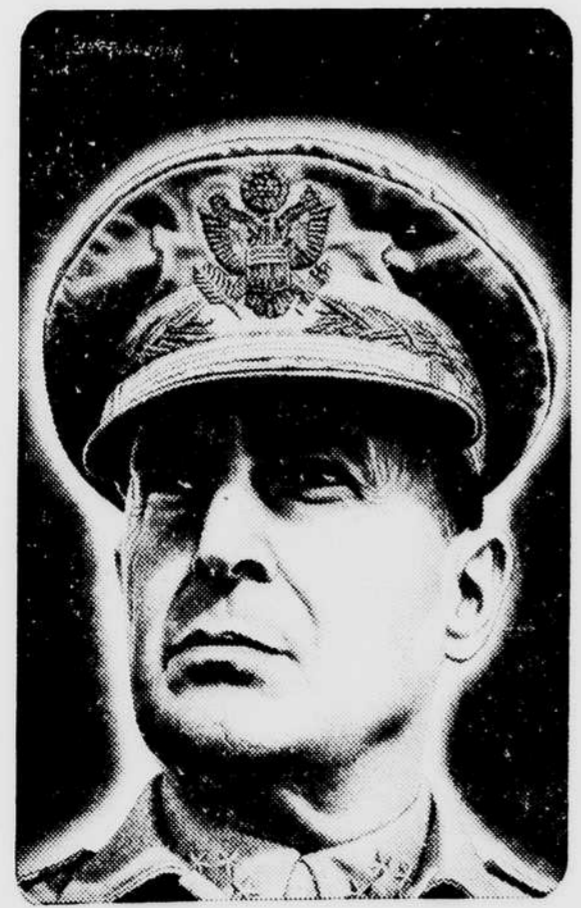
