With only minor developments in major labor disputes, the stage was set for the chief of the AFL-United Mine Workers to take over the spotlight as he prepared to disclose to soft coal operators his wage and other demands.

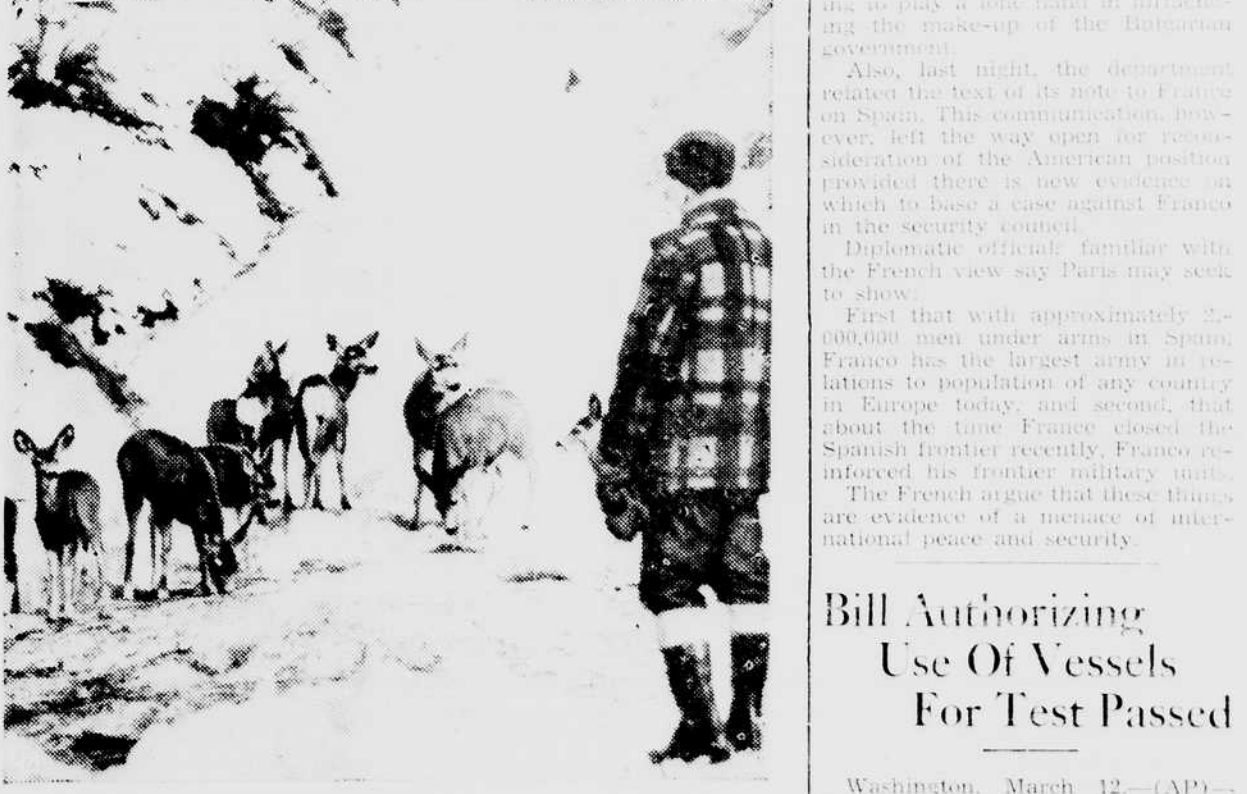
## Sharp Differences
