Then be ready to cash in on them. Incidentally, if you see your opposition missing such a chance, be ready to make the most of the error.

Had he spotted this, his side would have taken three prompt tricks there, setting South. But West pig-headedly led his third club, the 7, to the K. That gave South his chance, and he built a pretty play. He finessed the spade J scored the K and A, then raked in the heart J and 10. This last card squeezed East, who had to discard either his spade Q to make the 4 good, or one of his diamonds. He picked the diamond 2. Needing only one more trick, South now led the spade 4 to the Q and East had left only his diamond A-J, with the dummy holding the K-9. So East could score only the diamond A, then had to lead to the K for the game trick.

Victory garden production as one of the important parts of this entire emergency food program.

This is a definite and positive way in which a large percentage of our citizens can help in relieving the suffering of the starving people of the world."
