BLACK MARKET MEAT MAY BE U. S. GRADED

Washington—(AP)—If meat has a peculiar stamp which says "U. S. Grade" and "Passed," it comes from a legitimate and not a "black market" slaughter.

If it has a stamp applied by a grader who shows the federal grade and again says "U. S. Grade" and "Passed," it comes from a legitimate and not a "black market" meat.

Officials of the Agriculture Department's Inspection Division explained the difference to the Senate Agriculture Committee.

"When somebody brings in a carcass and wants it graded, our men grade it," he explained. "We have no authority to designate the circumstances of the purchase or slaughter."

Rev. Keys To Speak At Youth Meet

Charlotte, April 18—Rev. William Keys, executive secretary of the Youth of the World Council of Churches, will be the principal speaker at a great youth gathering in Charlotte, April 24, it was announced at a convocation headquarters here today. The Youth program will be a part of the North Carolina Convocation of Churches which comes to Charlotte for three days under the sponsorship of the North Carolina Council of Churches and the Charlotte Ministerial Association. A strong program has been arranged by the Executive Committee of the United Christian Youth of North Carolina of which Jim Sumralls of Durham is president and Miss Mary Louise Woodson of Queens college, Charlotte, advisor.

The Charlotte Youth Council will play host to the statewide Youth Assembly which will be representative of at least sixteen major Protestant denominations. Miss Gay Campbell, a student at Queens college and also field representative of the United Christian Youth of North Carolina, is in general charge of the program.

Mr. Keys, a Baptist minister, and a native of South Carolina, is a graduate of Furman university and Andover Theological Seminary. From the latter he won a fellowship with which he spent a year in Tokyo, Japan, living two more years in the Orient he served as pastor for a year at Rangoon. He has traveled widely and comes to the Convocation ably prepared to speak on "The Youth of Our World Today."

The Gastonia Youth Council under the leadership of Miss Marion Clark, advisor, and Miss Helen Thomas, president, will be in charge of the worship services which begin at 8:30 a. m. A welcome address will be given by David Hayes, president of the Mecklenburg Christian Youth Council. During the opening session reports will be heard concerning the State Council of Churches, the United Christian Youth Movement and other movements of youth throughout the world.

The new initiates are to participate in a fellowship ceremony Saturday morning before the group breaks camp at noon.

All campers were instructed to bring their own food and cooking utensils and prepare to cook their own meals.

Holt Thornton, of Durham, chief of the Order of the Arrow for Oconeechee Council, will direct the ceremonies for the three-day camp.

Cecil Webb, of Henderson, Scout Executive for the northern area of Oconeechee Council, made arrangements locally for the encampment and is one of the leaders in directing it.

EDGECOMBE FARMERS WIN COTTON AWARD

College Station, Raleigh, April 18.—Edgecombe county farmers have won the Atlantic Cotton Association's 1945 award to the North Carolina county making the greatest yearly improvement in cotton production. It was announced today by Dan F. Heller, cotton marketing specialist of the State College Extension Service.

Presentation of a trophy, the fourth to be awarded by the association in North Carolina, will be made in a Tarboro ceremony early next month. Dr. I. O. Schaub, director, will make the award for the State College Extension Service to W. J. Eason of Rt. 3, Tarboro, president of the Edgecombe County One-Variety Cotton Association.

Previous trophy winners in this state are Halifax, Hoke and Polk counties in that order. The Atlantic Association makes the annual award through the Extension Service on the basis of percentage of ginners and growers actively participating in the one-variety program, percentage of cotton planted to pure seed of an adapted variety, degree of one-variety improvement, two-year average improvement in better grade cotton, percentage of one-variety lint in comparison with total bales, and other factors.

AUTO AND TRUCK IN COLLISION HERE

A collision between a 1940 tractor and trailer owned by McLean Trucking Company and driven by Jahn Manuel Landreth, of Walkerton, and a 1937 Chevrolet driven by Boyd Wilton Smith, Jr., colored, of Warrenton, about four miles north of the city on U. S. highway No. 1 at midnight Tuesday resulted in considerable damage to both vehicles, according to a report today from the highway patrol office. No injuries were sustained by any of the occupants.

CHICKEN CONTEST DEADLINE REVEALED

College Station, Raleigh, April 18.—In a letter to North Carolina hatcherymen and poultry breeders, C. J. Maupin, State College Extension Service poultryman and chairman of the state's "Chicken of Tomorrow" committee, yesterday announced that April 23 is the deadline for local entries in the \$5,000 national contest aimed to develop heavier poultry.

Contestants this year will vie for state honors, winners entering district competition next year and shooting for the national title at the conclusion of the contest in 1948. A minimum of 50 chicks is required for entry, Maupin said, but lots of 100 to 300 are desirable.

Chicks will be grown to an age of 16 weeks with inspection at least once during the growing period for growth and feathering qualities by the state committee. Maupin said the state contest will close about August 13 with a \$500 cash award going to the winner.
