## Housewives May Find It Easier To Locate Meat

Raleigh, April 23. — Many housewives should soon find it easier to get meat as a result of new slaughtering controls, designed to expedite the available meat among slaughterers, that will go into effect shortly, OPA District Director Theodore S. Johnson pointed today.

Many parties have had trouble securing certain supplies of live stock recently, Johnson said, with others have been killing several times their normal proportion of the supply available. The new program, he explained, will provide a "balancing" system so that each legitimate slaughterer will be able to secure the same percentage of available hogs, cattle and calves as in 1944.

However, Johnson pointed out, farmers are not primarily affected by the new controls, since slaughtering by farmers — for their own use — will not be regulated by the new controls.

The new controls, as they affect directly inspected slaughtering plants, will be administered by the Department of Agriculture, Johnson said, and OPA will administer the regulations as they affect all other plants.

The price agency is increasing its enforcement staff to see that the new regulations are not circumvented, and to see that available meat is distributed in the "most equitable manner possible," he said.

## LARGE NUMBER AT FARM JEEP SHOW

A large number of farmers attended a demonstration of the use of a jeep in farming, held Saturday at the Henderson airport, according to a report received today.

The jeep was driven by George Hearn, of Greensboro, and showed many uses such as pulling farm implements, grain drills, tandem disks and mowers. A number of farmers also drove the jeep under actual farming conditions.

The demonstration was brought here in cooperation with Harvin-Melham, dealers of the Willys farm jeep.

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## Meat Cuts Must Show Grade Stamp

The local Office of Price Administration has received a communication from the U. S. Department of Agriculture stating that no beef, veal, or lamb may be sold in any retail store unless it bears the official U. S. Grade stamp upon it, it was announced today. (This order does not apply to pork.) Each cut of meat should have upon it the grade stamped so that it will be plainly visible to the customer. Thus, if even small cuts like steaks or chops are displayed in a meat counter, the grade mark should be visible on the outer edge of the cut, it was explained.

Sometimes ago a carcass could be graded by the farmer and the merchant and marked with an indelible pencil. This practice is no longer legal. No longer, other than a Federal Meat Grader, is allowed to grade meat, except a farmer selling direct to a consumer, but such a farmer must mark the carcass of the animal sold with a stamp that has been approved by the Department of Agriculture. In no instance is a farmer ever permitted to sell to a retailer in this manner. It is very unlikely that many farmers in this area have enough meat to sell to consumers that they wish to obtain an approved stamp, the office stated.

Merchants are advised that the Federal Meat Grader comes to Henderson three times a week on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. His first stop is at the Sanitary Market, and his last stop is at Newman and Seaman. He can be contacted at the Sanitary Market when his services are needed. The Federal Grader who comes to Henderson is O. L. Trent, and his address is c/o U. S. Department of Agriculture, Raleigh, N. C. Phone 6531.

The Area Price Control Board has been informed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture that only about half of the meat being sold in Vance county is Federally graded. The practice of selling ungraded meat must be stopped, for the protection of the consumer and the merchant. On future food surveys made by this office any market displaying meat for sale which does not bear the Official U. S. Grade mark will be reported to the Enforcement Division.

## Eleven Tried In Mayor's Court

Eleven defendants paid fines of from \$5 to \$30 in mayor's court today on charges of drunkenness, speeding and drunk driving.

Owen D. Cuthbert, Wilard W. Tesson, Charles E. Johnson, Leslie and Cleveland Sanford, Charlie Williams, Jasper M. Knight, colored, were tried for public drunkenness. Each was fined \$5 and costs.

George Jones, colored, tried for indecent exposure, was fined \$5 and costs.

Isham Wright, Jr., colored, was tried for speeding and for driving without an operator's license and was fined \$10 and costs.

Walter E. Doremy, white, tried for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$5 and costs.

Willie Davis, colored, was tried for drunk driving and for driving with improper brakes. Prayer for judgment was continued upon payment of \$50 and costs and his driver's license was revoked for one year.

Otha Hawk's, colored, was also tried for drunk driving and received a similar fine.
