




Both our dealers and our branches have run dry on parts and new machines. So the biggest chore is to

### No hoarding




At the start of the strike we had on hand at all our factories and branches just 837 tractors of all kinds-less than two days' production - and 405 of these werenot completed. Many of those on hand had one or more important parts missing-principally radiator cores. Most of the rest represented the normal daily

"float" between the end of the assembly line and the shipping platform. Naturally no tractors were made during the strike.
