Plans made For Rotary Meet In Elizabeth City

Elizabeth City, May 11.—High-lighted by after dinner addresses by Dr. Frank Porter Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, Kenneth C. Roy, Under-Secretary of War, Charles W. Pettongill of Greensboro, Connecticut, past vice president of Rotary International, and the Rev. S. Wade Marr, Jr., son of President Wade Marr of the East club, now in terminal leave from the Army in which he served as chaplain in the Pacific Theatre, going as far as Japan, the program of the district conference of Rotary International to be held here May 12-14 is complete to the last detail.
 Mr. Pettongill will deliver the address of the first plenary session of the conference which will be held at the Carolina Theatre Monday morning.
 The Rev. Mr. Marr will be featured as speaker at the Monday luncheon at the Hotel Virginia Dare which will be served at 12:30 p. m. General Roy will speak at the dinner Monday night, while both Dr. Graham and Mr. Pettongill are on the luncheon program Tuesday.
 Entertainment features of the program Monday include a Coast Guard air show, an informal reception at the Coast Guard Air Station Officers Club, and a band concert in front of the Hotel Virginia Dare. Cars are scheduled to leave the hotel for the air station at 2:15 Monday and to return to the hotels in ample time for the band concert which is scheduled to start at 5:30.
 The chairman of the conference which includes clubs of the newly formed 189th district, stretching from Manteo to Darlington, will arrive Sunday afternoon and will be tendered a buffet luncheon by the host club in the ballroom of the Hotel Virginia Dare Sunday evening at 6:30. Registration will begin an hour and a half before the luncheon, or at five o'clock in the afternoon.
