

Dispatch Election Party Is Very Largely Attended

One of the largest crowds ever to attend an election night party offered by the Daily Dispatch packed the area of Young street and overflowed into Garnett Saturday night to hear the returns from the county-wide Democratic primary.

It is believed that the results were obtained and announced with record speed, so far as counters at the polls went in completing their work.

For the first time ever, the Dispatch had a staff observer at every precinct in Henderson township, which includes all the five polling places in the city. Returns from the rural precincts were telephoned or brought in with unusual promptness and with exception of a single instance, all were in from rural areas by around 10 o'clock. The bulky vote in several of the city districts delayed the compilations there.

Every member of the staff functioned either in collecting or tabulating the returns, and made possible their early announcement.

George V. Jenkins, assisted by Tommy Powell, installed his amplifier system on the second story of the Dispatch building, and the radio, for many years a member of the staff, and veteran of many a Dispatch election party, did the announcing. All functioned smoothly and effectively, and the Dispatch acknowledges their services and its appreciation to them.

That goes, too, for all election officials to Chairman D. P. McArthur, of the county election board, and all who in any way had a hand in making it possible to render this service to the public.

The crowd was estimated as high as 2,000 at one time, and it was enthusiastic as well as patient. It was one of the most orderly election night crowds in the fifty years the Dispatch has furnished this service.

Episcopal Chimes Honor Mrs. Tempie Zollicoffer

Mrs. Zollicoffer, who was the widow of the late A. C. Zollicoffer, for many years a resident of this section of the State, died several years ago. Both she and her husband were prominent members of Holy Innocent's church in that city.

Roxboro Golfers To Play West End Group Wednesday

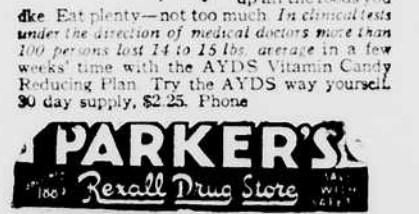

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Seniors At Service Of Methodists

Members of the graduating class of Henderson high school who will receive their diplomas next week, were guests at the morning service at the First Methodist church Sunday, when the pastor, Rev. C. D. Barcliff, preached a special sermon in their honor. His subject was "Faith."

The choir's anthem was "Open Our Eyes" by McFarlane.

The pastor's text was from Hebrews 11:8: "By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went."

The minister recounted the vicissitudes of the world into which the graduates soon will emerge, and admonished them to put their trust in God, as did Abraham. He challenged the young people to take over from the present generation and to do a better job for humanity than has been done before.

Coal To Be Available For Curing

Additional coal for tobacco curing was in sight today under a guarantee announced by the Solid Fuel Administration. Walter E. Hight, secretary of the Vance County AAA, said today.

All applicants for coal for tobacco curing are required, under the new procedure, to make a certification to the retail coal dealer of the amount of coal to be used for curing his crop. This must be done when the coal is given. The dealer then must submit these certifications on file in his office. The dealer will certify to the Solid Fuel Administration the number of tons of coal for which he has orders and certifications at the time he submits his request for directive coal. Hight explained.

Farmers desiring the coal may obtain tickets from dealers.

City Rates On Airport Priorities

Henderson's application for funds for construction of a modern airport near the city is near the very top in priorities for Federal aid when the bill now in Congress is enacted, and actual allocations can be made, Mayor Henry Powell said today. He learned on a visit last week to the office of George Garaffo, district representative of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, in Charlotte.

The mayor was in Charlotte with a group of local friends for a five-men's school, and called at the CAA office to learn the status of the application. He said he was told that the request not only was on the list but was near the very top in priority.

Plans for the airport were mapped more than a year ago, and application filed. Mr. Garaffo has visited Henderson many times and inspected proposed locations and has given his approval to at least two sites. Several hundred thousand dollars, in government, city and county funds, will be spent in providing the airport, it is understood.

Just when actual work can get under way is not known at this time, but authority has been given by both the county commissioners and the City Council to an engineering survey, although this has not been made as yet.
