## "HOLDING ON" IS TOPIC OF GARDNER

Rev. E. Norfleet Gardner, pastor of the First Baptist church, preached on the topic, "Holding On," Sunday at the morning worship hour. The text was from James 5:11, "Behold, we count them happy which endure."

"Happiness is elusive in definition and in quest," said the minister. "Can best see what it is by recognizing the things it is not. "Happiness comes from being steadfast and holding on, whatever the daily circumstances are."

"Why is one happy as he endures? Because in our patience we find the grace of God. Job, in the midst of his physical and mental affliction, found the grace of God."

"One is happy as he endures through suffering. At times, the gorges are deep and the torrents seem to overwhelm. Just as a field must be plowed deep if the grain is to grow, so one's life and soul must be plowed by the chastening of the Lord."

## PAUL EVANS JOINS NAVY ON MONDAY

Paul A. Evans, son of Morton M. Evans, of Henderson, enlisted in the navy at the Raleigh navy recruiting station Monday, it was announced today.

Evans made application with Chief Jackson, local navy recruiter, who is in Henderson each Monday for the purpose of accepting applications and furnishing information relative to enlistment.

The announcement again pointed out that the Raleigh navy recruiting would stay open Sunday, June 30, in order for men with bona fide dependents to enlist or reenlist on the last day to do so under the dependency act.

## NEW STAMP VALID ON CANNING SUGAR

Raleigh, June 25.—Housewives will get more canning sugar July 1 when spare stamp 10 becomes valid for five pounds. Theodore S. Johnson, State OPA Director, said today.

Johnson explained that this is the final stamp of the year for canning sugar, as no easing of the sugar situation is expected before 1947.

Although it is expected that 750,000 tons of sugar will be available this year for home canning sugar, compared with 500,000 tons during 1945, Johnson urged housewives not to use spare stamp 10 unless the

sugar is actually needed for home canning.

A recent report was circulated that coffee stamp 49 had become valid for sugar purchases, but this is completely erroneous, Johnson said. Spare stamp 49 became good on May 1, and the next regular stamp for table sugar will not be valid until September 1, he said.

## SEE CORN EXPERIMENTS

College Station, Raleigh, June 25. A tour of corn experiments in eight counties of Eastern Carolina to study fertilization practices and soil management will be held on July 29, 30, and 31, it is announced by Dr. Ralph W. Cummings, head of the Agronomy Department at State College.
