Baleigh. July 17.—(P)—A total of 1,330 picts of mayornacise and salard inesting containing mineral oil has been confiscated and destroyed in the Asheville area during the past few days, Dr. E. W. Constable, director of the Pure Food Division of the State Department of Agriculture renorted techy.

Dr. Constable said the destruction of the salad dreesing was orderer by Federal Judge E. Yates Webb Ir. U. S. Diatrict Court in Asheville. The products and event destroyed were a portion of 8,000 pints of salar dreesing placed under State embarg several months and.

Dr. Constable said the Federal and State Pure Food officials were continuing their fight on salad dressings centacing mineral oil.

"This substitute is part ularly obnoxious because mineral oil when taken into the system along withother foods tends to extract from these foods vitamins A and D." he said.

Thre are 18 such camps. The inmates are charged with having fostered Nazi ideology and otherwise having furthered the aims of the Nazi party.


